Dear Friends

Spring flowers came very early this year – I spotted a tulip way back in January and there are banks of daffodils out now which we would normally expect to see much closer to Easter Day. Sometimes our lives seem a bit topsy turvy, just like this very unseasonal weather. But Spring is a time of growth and new beginnings, and the evidence of that is in the fresh growth and the lengthening days which take us away from the darkest days of Winter. For Christians, Easter Day is the day we celebrate the greatest feast of the Christian calendar. We believe that Jesus' life and teaching showed us how to turn a topsy turvy world into a world where love and compassion and humility can overcome the darkness of evil and lead to life everlasting.

Christians prepare for this great feast day by setting aside extra time for prayer, reflection and study during the forty days of Lent. It's a bit like spring cleaning our homes, when we do away with accumulated dirt, dust and unwanted rubbish to make them warm and welcoming for our families and friends. The clearing out of the accumulated dirt and rubbish in our minds helps us to be ready to welcome God into our lives through a greater understanding of the meaning of Jesus' life and teaching. This year Easter day falls very early in our calendar, and by the time you read this we will be reaching the 'half way' point of Lent, known as Mothering Sunday in the church calendar. Mothering Sunday gives us an opportunity to take a short pause in our Lenten disciplines to reflect on the joys and gift of motherhood. Each one of us can do that, in deep affection and gratitude for the gift of life we have been given, through our own mothers and the grace and love of God.

Palm Sunday is our next pause on the journey to Easter day. On Saturday 19th March a Messy Church will be held at Weston Sub Edge village hall from 10.30 – 12.30. Everyone is welcome to come and join us in a morning of craft activities which will focus on the Easter story and will be followed by sharing lunch together. On Sunday 20th we will process through Aston Sub Edge and celebrate our Palm Sunday Eucharist as a Benefice family at St Andrews.

Then we begin a journey through Holy Week when we remember the events which led Jesus into Jerusalem and ultimately to His death on a cross, crucified by the Roman authorities because they saw His challenge as a threat to the absolute control of their mighty empire and to the local power bases of the religious authorities in Jerusalem. It is quite amazing that a humble Jewish carpenter from a backwater of the Roman Empire, whose non-violent message of peace and love led to His death, should have so many followers to this day. If you wish to find out more about Christianity, do get in touch with either Debbie or me. We will be pleased to advise about courses and books which will help you to explore our faith. And of course, we would be delighted to welcome you to one of our church services during Lent and on Easter Day.

Debbie and I wish you all a joyful and happy Easter.

THE POLICE ARE BOUND BY THE CONFINES OF THE CONSTABULARY; THEY WILL **NOT** TELL ANYONE WHO HAS MADE THE REPORT. **NO ONE** WILL FIND OUT YOUR NAME OR ADDRESS. THEY WILL TAKE YOU SERIOUSLY

When you leave your name it carries more weight to your complaint and the police are more able to do something about the situation. An antisocial behaviour situation will often need several reports to enable the police to build a case and act, so please keep reporting, and encourage others to do the same.

If you do not report incidents yourself you lose the right to complain.

So please, help the village by reporting any antisocial behaviour to the police on **101**.

**LOCAL WALKS WITH THE
COTSWOLDS VOLUNTARY WARDENS
March 2016**

Spinning and Weaving at Stanton – Thursday 3rd March - Moderate

We will walk up to the Guildhouse where we will hear about the history and philosophy of this Arts & Crafts centre, before climbing the scarp and returning via Buckland. 3 hours: 6 miles.

Start: 10:00 am Stanton Village Car Park). OS Map ref SP 067 344.

Isbourne Way 3 (Toddinton to Wormington) – Tuesday 8th March - Moderate

This is the third in a series of five circular walks which will incorporate the whole of the new Isbourne Way, from the source of the Isbourne River to its confluence with the Avon near Evesham. Breakfast and/or lunch can be obtained at The Pheasant. 3 hours: 6 miles.

Start: 10:00 am The Pheasant Inn, Toddington GL54 5DT at the intersection of the B4632 and the B4077. OS Map ref SP 048 325.

An Amble from Adlestrop – Thursday 10th March - Moderate

A lovely spring walk from Adlestrop Village Hall car park passing Chastleton House and Chastleton Barrow. The village of Cornwell and the Daylesford Estate are on our route. 3 hours: 6 miles.

Start: 10:00 am Adlestrop Village Hall car park - donation. OS Map ref SP 241 272.

A Glimpse through a Window – Saturday 12th March - Moderate

A lovely walk in a wild area before focussing on Brockhampton Park and its benefactors. Bring packed lunch and drinks. 5.5 hours: 10 miles.

Start: 9:30 am Whittington Village Green opposite telephone box, Please park considerately in village. OS Map ref SP 014 209.

Water, water, everywhere – Thursday 17th March - Moderate

A circuit including most of the streams flowing into the River Windrush at Guiting Power and the structures and wildlife that have grown up around them. Bring suitable refreshment. Lunch available at the Farm Park cafe on our return. 3 hours: 6 miles.

Start: 10:00 am Cotswold Farm Park (by kind permission). OS Map ref SP 115 266.

Members of Cotswold District Council's Cabinet have recommended that the authority should freeze its share of local residents' Council Tax payments for 2016/17, following a 5% cut in 2015/16, a 3% cut in 2014/15 and a 5% reduction in 2013/14. Last year's 5% cut was hailed as the biggest in the country and the previous 5% cut for 2013/14 also led the field. Should the full Council agree to the proposed freeze for 2016/17 when it next meets, the actual amount being charged would be lower than the figure ten years ago. This means the typical payment for a resident in a Band D property would have seen a real terms cut of 25% over the last six years.

The Cabinet have also confirmed that imposing a freeze would not affect any of the Council's frontline services and that there would be no increases in, car parking charges, and green waste collection charges for yet another year.

Commenting after the meeting, CDC Leader Cllr Lynden Stowe said:

“At a time when most local authorities are increasing their share of Council Tax, I am very pleased that we have been able to recommend a freeze. We are also recommending no increases in the price of our weekly green waste kerbside collection service at £30 for the year and the charges in our car parks. This has all been achieved despite a reduction of over 50% in core government grants to the Council over the last four years.

“We are committed to providing services which provide excellent value for money, and I am very pleased that the Cabinet has been able to make a ‘no change’ recommendation that won't leave taxpayers out of pocket. We can do this because of the savings we have achieved over the last few years, mostly as a result of our joint working with other councils. We have developed a very close relationship with West Oxfordshire District Council, sharing a large number of posts ranging from senior management to officer level. Both councils are also building strong ties with Cheltenham and Forest of Dean Councils under the 2020 Partnership shared working programme.”

Don't forget, British Summer Time starts on 27th March.

Technically when local time is about to reach 1:00am on Sunday, 27th March 2016, clocks are turned **forward** 1 hour to 2:00am.
