Dear Friends

The Easter season is here at last after the rigours of Lent and the absence of flowers in the church and no alleluias! I wonder how we all managed with our Lenten disciplines? What I hope and pray above all is that now all around us speaks of renewal, of joy and of new beginnings, that you will experience it all with a renewed sense of thankfulness. In the church it is a time of amazing joy as we celebrate once again the resurrection of Jesus, restoration of hope to shattered disciples, assurance of the triumph of life over death. Alongside the Easter Eggs and Easter bunnies the world around us is bursting into life, the trees are in bud if not already showing their spring coat of fragile green and the church too is filled with flowers, we can sing the Gloria again and as many alleluias as we can fit in. I very much hope and pray that your hearts will be filled with that same joy.

That said, it will feel like a vacancy! But the really important thing is to see it as an amazing opportunity and a time of exploration and growth.

The regular things will not suddenly cease – there will still be Honeyangels, there will still be Messy Church, there will still be Bible Study – but it is a time when people discover the unplumbed depths of their spirituality or realise that they are rather good at taking a lead. It is not a time for closing things down but for being open to the movement of the spirit and in which the prevailing culture must be one of “we can do this”. Over the next little while, representatives from each of the parishes will put together a Parish Profile. This is an important document which will eventually be sent to applicants for the post, so it has to be enticing! Please pray for them as they work to produce this.

My hopes for you as six parishes and part of the Vale and Cotswold Edge is that you will work ever more closely together, sharing worship, enriching each other, supporting each other with a deep and growing sense of being the body of Christ in this place. We are called to mirror this in our life here as church with a deep sense that what we do together will give greater glory to God and build us up as his body here on earth. As Edward and I leave we shall keep you all in our prayers and in our thoughts and we ask that you pray for us and for the people of Addington on the next step of our Christian pilgrimage.

MAURICE CHARLES ANDREWS MBE : OBITUARY.

Maurice was the ninth child of eleven born to George and Mary Andrews (with another adopted) at Wells Gardens, Broadway on June 10th 1923.

His childhood was happy but materially poor and was recorded in his book, 'A Village Remembered' which he wrote in the 1970's. He was a Cub and Scout and sang in St Michael's Church Choir.

He went to Broadway School under an inspirational Head Teacher, Archibald Bridgeman and left at 14 to become a Grocer's Boy for the Midland Stores before joining Charles Steward's Building firm as a Clerk. Here he was given the opportunity to attend evening classes in Evesham to gain qualifications.

When WW2 started he joined the LDV or Home Guard before enlisting in the RAF on 1941, aged 18. He wanted to be a pilot but chronic colour blindness prevented this so he became a 'Backroom Boy' dealing with security issues.

In 1942 he was posted to India. Here he served on the staff of South East Asia Command under Lord Louis Mountbatten and was proud to have had a conversation with him about Broadway. Maurice also attended one of Gandhi's mass rallies and had never seen so many people in one place at the same time. The Indian experience left an impression on him for the rest of his life and was a considerable eye-opener for a young lad from a small Cotswold village.

He returned to the UK in 1945 and signed on for another year at the Air Ministry where he was promoted to Flight Sergeant. Here he met a WAAF Corporal, Eira Wyn-Evans, and they were married in 1947 following demob. His first job on civvy street was as a Production Controller in Luton & then near Swansea where their first child was born. However, Maurice wanted to return to Broadway and the family set up their first real home in Sandscroft Avenue in 1948, where their second child was born a few year's later.

He got a clerical job with the building firm of W.A.Cox in Evesham and then moved to the office of Gordon Russell's before going to Arthur Parker's building firm where he became Director and Secretary until 1957.

Maurice became self-employed as an Accountant and Secretary in the late 1950's before setting up two companies, Dunelm Estates and Dunelm Trading. The latter, an ironmonger's, was with his brother, Harry, in Leamington Road.

Maurice started his Community Service by being elected onto Broadway Parish Council in 1952 and he served on it until 1963. He was also elected to Evesham Rural District Council in 1955. He served on several committees and was Chairman of the Housing Committee in 1958. He was also on various charity committees and a School Governor. He was a keen member of Broadway Cricket Club and rose from Teaboy in 1933 to Chairman in 1960. He negotiated the renting of the cricket ground before the club eventually bought it. He was also a member of the Football Club.

Anne and Josie would like to thank everyone for their kind wishes and cards following the death of Freda King. Freda was the oldest surviving resident who was born and brought up in the village. She was delighted to have celebrated her 100th birthday last year with all her family and friends. It was her greatest wish to end her life peacefully in her cottage in Willersey and that wish was granted on the 27th February. "The life of one we love is never lost...her influence goes on through all the lives she ever touched"

LOCAL WALKS WITH THE COTSWOLDS VOLUNTARY WARDENS

April 2016

A Quartet of Counties from Adlestrop – Wednesday 13th April - Moderate

Ninety years ago this walk would have passed through four counties - today it only touches three. From Adlestrop, we walk to Little Compton and then on to Kitebrook. Our next stop is Evenlode, and we return to Adlestrop via Chastleton House & the Diamond Way. Please bring a packed lunch. 6 hours: 11 miles.

Start: 10:00 am Adlestrop Village Hall car park – donation. OS Map ref SP 241 272.

Early Birds – Tuesday 19th April - Moderate

A beautiful and varied circular walk from St Mary's, taking in the hamlet of Farmcote and a section through Guiting Wood. We will walk through varied habitats and hope to see common farm land birds and early summer visitors. Please bring packed lunch. 4 hours: 8 miles.

Start: 10:00 am St Mary's Church, Temple Guiting. Park at Temple Guiting Village Hall. OS Map ref SP 090 279.

East of Adlestrop – Friday 22nd April - Moderate

A chance to see the eastern side of the Cotswolds. Starting in Adlestrop we walk northwards to Chastleton and then east towards the Rollright hillside, then through Salford and Cornwell, returning via Daylesford to Adlestrop. Please bring packed lunch/refreshments. 5 hours: 10 miles.

Start: 9:30 am Adlestrop Village Hall car park - donation. OS Map ref SP 241 272.

On Track – Saturday 30th April - Moderate

We follow an ancient track as we explore the Cotswold hills and valleys. Bring a packed lunch. 5.5 hours: 10 miles.

Start: 9:30 am Didbrook. Meet outside the church; park considerately in village. OS Map ref SP 055 314.

PLEASE use appropriate footwear as some walks may be steep and muddy in places. EASY - Length may vary but terrain is mainly flat (level); MODERATE - includes some hills and rough ground. STRENUOUS – may be rough underfoot and ascents and descents may be steep. We welcome guide and hearing dogs - sorry, others not allowed.

Walks are free although we do invite donations to help fund our conservation and improvement work.

The Wardens run a full programme of guided walks throughout the Cotswolds. For more information see www.escapetothecotswolds.org.uk or Tel: 01451 862000, also for any changes to arrangements such as due to extreme weather.

In 1963 ill-health and a wish for better education opportunities for his children led to a move to Eastbourne which had been a popular family holiday venue. Here he joined the Dental Estimates Board and investigated dentists who were trying to defraud the NHS. He continued playing cricket for the DEB and also qualified as an Umpire in the district.

Maurice became a voluntary worker at the Citizen's Advice Bureau in Eastbourne and also joined RAFA and other local societies. He left the DEB in 1968 and had some part-time jobs until the early 1970s when, with both children starting their own lives, he and Eira returned to the Cotswolds and finally settled in Willersey.

Now fully retired, he became Clerk of Willersey Parish Council in 1979 that began 33 unbroken years of service as Clerk, Councillor and Chairman. Just two of the many issues he was involved with were the flooding problems in Willersey and the weight restriction for lorries in the village. He also set up the Willersey Forum where inhabitants could come to raise queries and discuss matters as well as setting up a welcome booklet for people moving into the village. He was very proud that he had not missed a meeting until the very end.

Maurice also keenly supported Willersey Footlights and the Wednesday Club. He belonged to the British Legion, RAFA and was President of the Evesham Branch of Burma Star. Along with his wife, Eira, he attended many Remembrance Services including two marches at the Cenotaph. He continued his connection with CAB by helping to set up the Evesham branch. He was also Village Correspondent for the Evesham Journal.

Maurice, along with Eira, attended many funerals of local people and ex-service personnel – sometimes being virtually the only mourners - as he felt it so important to recognise the life of each person.

He was greatly influenced by his mother, Mary, to help others as well as the extended family. She had not only raised a large family and taken in washing to help ends meet but had helped at births around Broadway and lay out those who died as well as helping other villagers in many other ways.

Maurice wanted to help 'ordinary folk' and did this in many ways – offering advice, when sought, and applying for help from organisations were just two of them. All of this in total confidence and much remains unknown.

Maurice also managed to research his family tree back to the 15thC and held a lot of information regarding the history of Willersey and Broadway, giving many talks to local groups.

Due rewards, though not sought after, came in Maurice's later life. He received Maundy money from the Queen in 2003 at Gloucester Cathedral. Although being on the border of Worcestershire and Gloucestershire had its drawbacks for some Parish Council matters, it did mean that he was put forward by both Councils and went to two Garden Parties at the Palace! The proudest day, however, came in 2007 when he received the MBE from Prince Charles and had a brief conversation with him about Lord Mountbatten.

In 2012 ill health forced him to curtail all activities though he maintained his interest in them. He and Eira moved to Mill House Care Home in Chipping Campden at Christmas 2013 where they were wonderfully cared for until each passed away. They also received excellent care over the years from their GPs in Mickleton, Broadway and Campden as well as at various local NHS Hospitals.

Maurice was a devoted husband, a wonderful father, a proud grandfather and also proud to come from the Cotswolds but, above all, he was a good, caring, gentle man.

Update on Willersey's Glebe Land.

1. Bishop's Review

On her appointment, Bishop Rachel announced that she would be launching a review into "the Willersey matter". That has now been held. Saint Peter's PCC declined to take part in this review because:

The review was premature: given that the ongoing emergence of damaging revelations has yet to cease and the Diocese has not yet withdrawn fully from the intended sale and development.

The Review Group lacked independence: As an example, one member of the group came to it with preconceptions, having previously responded on behalf of the Church Commissioners using this Review being forthcoming as the justification for ignoring and dismissing all of the valid points and concerns raised in a letter of objection from the Parish and pre-judging the Diocesan staff's conduct, writing that any problems had arisen "in good faith".

The review process was subjective and opinion-based: asking "1. From your experience, what might be improved in any communication process concerning Glebe land transactions?" and "2. Do you have any specific "dos or don'ts" that the Review Group may find helpful?" This is a most serious matter with far-reaching consequences, it is regrettable, for the Diocese and the Church of England that this review avoided getting to the root causes of what has happened because they appear fundamental and merit a proper inquiry.

WILLERSEY WEDNESDAY CLUB

At our meeting on 2nd March, Dr. Richard Long spoke to us about Lawrence of Arabia. He was a British scholar, writer and soldier and served in the Middle East where he mobilised the Arab Revolt in World War 1. On his return to England he served in the RAF and the Royal Tank Corps, under different names. He was sadly killed at the age of 45 whilst riding his motor bike at 90 mph. It was amazing to learn of all the things that Lawrence had achieved in his relatively short life.

The meeting on 16th March was cancelled owing to the Thanksgiving Service for the life of Maurice Andrews. Maurice had been a long time member of the Wednesday Club and both he and Eira, his wife had served as chairman of the club. In 2015 he joined us for our summer party and we celebrated his 92nd birthday with a cake.

The next meeting on 30th March will be Members Day, and on 13th April, Nicholas Clarke pays a return visit to talk on 'The Old Levant'.

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As if it wasn't enough that in recent years the village has become blighted with parked cars on the public highway, access roads, across the greens, and on the greens, pavements are now also being singled out. I have just watched an elderly lady with her dog walk out in the road around parked cars on the pavement along Collin Lane. Why should she have to? But clearly she could not get between the cars and the hedge. Why oh why are some people so thoughtless??

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I want again to ask dog owners in Ley Orchard to pick up their dog mess. It's on the footpath and children attending Willersey School use the route. Perpetrators will be reported if spotted. Can those walking their dogs please carry bags and ensure any mess is picked up. We have five dog waste bins in Willersey.

2. Meeting with the Archdeacon

On Monday 7 March, the PCC's representatives, Lord Dear (GD) and Robert McNeill-Wilson (RMW) met the Diocese's representatives, Archdeacon Robert Springett (RS) and Colin Rank (CR), the Chairman of the Diocesan Board of Finance. Rev Craig Bishop (Team Rector) and Canon Katrina Scott, (Rural Dean) were also present.

The land: GD and RMW drew the Diocese's attention to the discrepancy between all of the assurances given by the Diocese since July 2015 that Terrify was the only land which it intended to sell for development and the maps obtained (as reported in the February Village News) showing an area for sale of four times that size. The PCC will continue to hold the Diocese accountable for honouring all of the commitments it has given, regarding the limitation on its intended sale and development.

Local Plan consultation: The PCC continued to insist that the Diocese respects Willersey's participation in the Cotswold District Council's formal consultation on planning policies and the Local Plan and accept that it would be disrespectful, inappropriate and premature for the Diocese to seek any planning permission until the outcome of that consultation is known. This is particularly important given that the Parish Quota already appears certain to be exceeded by developments accepted by a responsible parish. The Parish Council is petitioning the CDC to remove the village's glebe land from the Local Plan, as required by the unanimous vote in Willersey's first public meeting on this matter, and parishioners have reinforced this by expressing their views directly as part of the CDC's consultation.

Diocese assurances overdue: Archdeacon RS had offered to meet PCC representatives to consider options for providing Willersey parishioners with real assurance that the Diocese would never build on Upper Marbrook (the glebe field next to St Peter's Church). RMW had also highlighted the need to provide this assurance for Lower Marbrook, (the ancient ridge and furrow land on the other side of the road to Saintbury), given the concerns aroused by the Diocese's maps, mentioned above. RMW had reminded Archdeacon RS that it was now four months since this commitment was given, however the meeting failed to address this matter.

In summary, the PCC regrets that it is unable to report any progress arising from this meeting. The PCC is liaising with Archdeacon Robert Springett to arrange another meeting in which it will continue to press for progress.
