As we move closer to the day of the EU referendum, I have been prompted to reflect on the vehemence of the two arguments – leave or remain - and what that tells me about how we value our identity. Identity is a greatly cherished part of every human being – to belong means to be loved in some way or other. Whether we are considering our membership or otherwise of the European Union, our own ethnic or national identity or our place in a family, social group or workplace, the absence of such an identity can be deeply disturbing and unsettling. So to be comfortable with who we are plays a vital part in our own peace of mind and personal contentment.

Over the next few months there are a number of baptisms in our churches. Baptism is the primary layer of identity for every Christian. Baptism also confers on the recipient a Christian name. It is our name which becomes our own personal identity for the rest of our lives. There is a beautiful line in scripture (Isaiah Ch. 43: v.1) which tells us that God has called each one of us by name and loves each one of us. Baptism is also when we become a member of the worldwide family of Christians, committed to leading a life which is modelled on the life of Jesus. In infant baptism, this commitment is taken on by parents and godparents who promise to guide the child in Christian living until the time they can take responsibility themselves. Peace and contentment are the hope of every Christian, offered as it is by God to every human being if we choose to accept his love.

Of course, when there is a birth, there has to be a birthday too! The birthday of the Church is celebrated on the Feast of Pentecost. It was the a moment when those who had known Jesus personally or had heard about him through friends or acquaintances felt inspired to go out and tell the world about their great discovery that Jesus was and is alive amongst us. Since those early days, Christianity has spread across the world and represents approximately 31.5% of the world's population, the largest single faith group in the world. Not surprisingly, such a huge family can boast a variety of identities, but always in the knowledge that we belong to one big family. Our European neighbours are also part of one bigger family, but each with their own identity, just like the UK. Perhaps, in your choice of vote you will be expressing something about your personal identity, be it from a social, political or economic perspective within the context of the bigger family of nations. Identifying with other nations holds a greater prospect for peace and security, and whether we are in or out of the EU, our hope must be that we can live together in peace with our neighbours. Identity is part of our make-up and crucial to how we see ourselves in relationship to others. Perhaps, as you consider how to cast your vote, you might like to give some thought to what identity means to you!

And if you wish to explore identity as a member of the Christian family do contact one of the clergy team to have a chat. In the autumn we are running a 4 week course for those who are interested in being baptised or confirmed. Look out for dates posted on our church notice boards and in the magazine. Glebe Land "Narrative"

Victory for Huntley in Glebe Land Battle with Diocese

Some months before the Diocese of Gloucester and its partner, the infamous 'promoter' Gladman turned their attention on Willersey's glebe land, they had launched their attempt, with similar thwarting of due process, at developing rural land in the parish of Huntley, near Newent. At the end of April, the Planning Inspectorate responded to the appeal by Gladman against the refusal of the planning permission they had applied for on behalf of the Diocese by rejecting it on the grounds of sustainability. Unsurprisingly, Huntley parishioners are delighted to have defended their parish against this "over-housing" and retain the open fields on the edge of their village. This victory, and the result of the Collin Lane land appeal, should act as an inspiration for Willersey parishioners. They show that, even with the Government's current drive for house-building, nothing is a foregone conclusion and that it is worth fighting every step of the way.

Churchwarden's Letter to the Bishop, 16 May 2016

Dear Bishop Rachel,

At the end of February, Archdeacon Robert wrote to parishioners, on your behalf, assuring them that the Diocese would; "await the result of the review of the local plan before deciding what, **if any**, further action we might propose". Only a fortnight later, on 7 March, when Lord Dear and I met him and the Chairman of the Gloucester Diocesan Board of Finance (GDBF), Colin Rank, they told us the Diocese intended to disregard this commitment. When we refused to accept this and insisted the Diocese reconsider this extraordinary decision, they agreed they should go away and revisit this with Diocesan colleagues.

On 18 April, they returned to confirm that the Diocese remained intent on reneging on the undertaking, given on your behalf, citing, as justification, their groundless expectation that the Cotswold District Council's review of the Local Plan would become protracted. Their letter, of 20 April, confirmed that decision.

On 29 April, you responded to my letter of 21 April, appealing to you to intervene and honour your commitment to allow our parishioners the time they deserved for their views to be considered in the review of the Local Plan. You responded, endorsing the decision to disregard that commitment. You indicated that you sensed that there might be some confusion around the different phases of the consultation on the Local Plan and how these related to Terrify. Four days later, Archdeacon Robert demonstrated this confusion lay within your team when he wrote to advise me that you would now contain your impatience and wait for the next iteration of the Draft Local Plan, but only because this would be just a fortnight later.

Our May meeting for most of the group was continuing the embroidered book cover started in April. Jane was on hand to advise with stitched and colours for those wanting a little more inspiration. Next month's project was discussed and a requirement list given out. All agreed that a trip to Croome Court in August to views the embroidery celebrating Capability Brown's 300 years was a good idea. It is hoped the group will be able to enjoy a cream tea after touring the exhibition.

LOCAL WALKS WITH THE COTSWOLDS VOLUNTARY WARDENS June 2016 The Cotswolds at War – Wednesday 1st June - Strenuous

A walk from Chipping Campden to Broadway Tower to discover the part played by the Cotswolds in the Civil War, WW2 and the Cold War. Please bring a packed lunch. 6 hours: 11 miles. *Start:* 10:00 am Chipping Campden School, Cider Mill Lane, Chipping Campden. OS Map ref SP 154 395.

STRENUOUS – may be rough underfoot and ascents and descents may be steep. We welcome guide and hearing dogs - sorry, others not allowed. Walks are free although we do invite donations to help fund our conservation and improvement work.

In that letter he expressed the hope that we would agree that it would be entirely proper, thereafter, for the GDBF to start "to engage in a constructive dialogue as to what any development should entail" with our Parish Council. The Parochial Church Council rejects this, emphatically. As you know, our Parish Council is opposed to any additional development, Willersey's local amenities and services are already over-stretched and its development quota is already to be exceeded significantly. Furthermore, we have just received notification of the submission of a planning application for **yet another ten houses** so, given the commitment you gave, personally, to our parishioners that you would not see our village "over-housed", it would not be proper at all for the GDBF to take this action, it would be grossly insensitive.

In October, you called a public meeting, which we duly attended, as requested. Given your recognition of the importance of effective communication and the events and your radical intentions, outlined above, we feel it important that you now reciprocate by attending another public meeting, at our invitation, in our Village Hall. if Diane could provide us with the dates of some evenings when you could be available, we will finalise a date, book the Village Hall and notify our parishioners accordingly.

In your recent letter, you raised the subjects of trust and fear. These are powerful feelings, not life choices, as you suggest. There is no evidence of fear arising within our parish from the Diocese's actions. Furthermore, trust is not its opposite. Our Parish's understandable mistrust of you and the Diocese has arisen from what they have witnessed and experienced over the past ten months. That mistrust can only deepen as a consequence of this latest, sorry sequence of events.

In terms of feelings; far more powerfully within Willersey and our PCC, you will be aware that there is justified anger towards the Diocese. Before condemning this, I ask you to remember the anger and indignation Our Lord expressed, so forcefully and forthrightly, at the attitudes, behaviours and actions of another priesthood and administration in His words in Chapter 23 of Saint Matthew's Gospel. Just as you and Robert have dismissed our reports and criticisms of the clergy's and Diocesan actions, repeatedly, as "narrative", we know that the scribes and Pharisees considered themselves to be beyond reproach, by virtue of their exalted positions.

As clergy who know me will attest, I am most exercised by God's Mission. I pray that the Huntley affair, all the damage it has done and its fruitless outcome will cause you, your Council and Diocesan Board of Finance and the Church Commissioners to question the wisdom of your campaign of asset-stripping, the ruthlessness with which it is being prosecuted and the damage it has done and continues to do to Mission and to the reputations of yourself, as Bishop, and those of the other clergy involved, the Diocese and, most importantly, our Church of England.
