PASTORAL LETTER FOR MAY/JUNE 2018

Having celebrated the joy of Easter, the Church, whilst continuing to rejoice in the physical, spiritual and emotional resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead – giving to the whole of creation *hope*, in this world and the next – now looks forward to two further significant events.

First, we remember Christ's ascension into heaven. After all that he went through for each one of us on Good Friday, Christ ascended into heaven to be reunited with his Father and to sit at God's right hand – the place of privilege and honour, as befits the one who is King of kings and Lord of lords. Immediately before his ascension, Christ said to his disciples,

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you" Matthew 28: 19-20 (NRSV).

These words are often referred to as the Great Commission. They apply to every Christian and, let's be honest, can make us feel afraid, even inadequate.

That's where the other significant event that I mentioned comes to the fore. The other great occasion that we look forward to after Easter is Pentecost, or Whitsun. On this day, we remember the outpouring of God's Holy Spirit, promised by Jesus, on *all* believers. It is the Holy Spirit who empowers and enables Christians to share the Good News of Jesus Christ – and I don't know about you, but, just as I'm ready for some sunshine, so I could do with some Good News!

When we feel fearful to share the hope and fullness of life promised by Jesus, I encourage you to remember that, in St Paul's words, 'God did not give us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love' 2 Timothy 1: 7 (NKJV). Here's a wonderful thought – the same Spirit that raised Christ from the dead dwells within *every* Christian and makes us able, despite our own fear and trembling, to share with others the life-changing, world-changing Good News of Jesus Christ.

Hope, indeed, for what can seem, on occasions, a world with very little hope. With love, Scott

Flower Foray on and around Cleeve Common – Friday 29th June - Moderate

A Fabulous Flower Foray! With Conservation Officer Ellie Phillips, we hope to showcase the wonderful range of wildflowers that grow on both the Common and nearby butterfly reserves. Bring packed lunch and wear sturdy footwear for scrambling over rougher areas. 5 hours: 5 miles.



Windrush and Wardens Way Circular – Walk 3 – Thursday 3rd May - Moderate

'Mind the Gap'

Although butterflies are very weather dependant, April is often the month when we start to see butterflies like the yellow brimstone and tortoiseshell, that have over wintered in our garages and garden sheds, and now living out their brief lives in these first few weeks of early summer. Orange tipped butterflies are another to be seen just now.

However, there is usually something of a 'gap' in May as other types of butterfly have yet to develop. But come July it is normally a good time to see newly hatched whites, comma, peacock and red admirals in our gardens; and in a good year painted ladies - a summer visitor from Morocco. For those who get out on the footpaths or whose gardens border farm land, slightly more unusual butterflies such as speckled wood and marbled white can also be seen around Willersey.

Although a few butterfly species like the comma have done well recently, the overall picture is sadly one of butterfly decline. We only have to see how clear our car windscreens are nowadays to demonstrate the general insect loss. Strangely, the low numbers of hedgehog road casualties also underlines this wildlife decline.

But on a cheerier note by the time this village news edition drops through our letterboxes pretty much all of our summer migrant birds should have arrived. Chiffchaffs calling their name, swallows perhaps already building nests and screaming swifts, who have not stopped flying since last seen in Willersey, will be much in evidence. If you've seen or heard all of these listen out for the scratchy song of the white throat, another migrant from Africa.

Then CDC will process the application and then issue a bidding number which can be used to lodge a bid on properties as they become available.
