PASTORAL LETTER FOR JULY 2018

Count your blessings!

I'm very privileged in my role to be invited into our wonderful schools at Honeybourne, Pebworth and Willersey. In each school I have been accepted as part of the family, which is a great joy to me. Having been a healthcare chaplain for many years, being involved in schools is a relatively new aspect of ministry but one that I absolutely love. I'm grateful to the staff and students for the warmth and generosity of their welcome.

Recently, in assemblies and collective worship, I've encouraged those present to think about things for which they are grateful. At one of the schools I took in a large jar – we called it our 'Thank you Jar' – and everyone was invited to write one thing that they wanted to say thank you for. I then left the jar in school until my next visit. By the time I went back, it was crammed full of slips of paper. Children were grateful for mums, dads, grandparents, brothers and sisters, extended family, carers, the school, their teachers, pets and so much more besides. It was humbling and encouraging to be presented with a visible reminder of the many blessings that we receive on a daily basis and which, so often, we all take for granted.

I have been so inspired by the children's example that I'm going to do something similar myself and want to encourage you to do the same. You may or may not want to use a 'Thank you Jar' (I'm going to!) but, even if you don't, why not, at the end of every day, before you go to sleep, recall one good thing that has happened to you, or that was said to you, or an act of kindness shown towards you, or the beauty of the area where we live, or whatever it might be, and say 'thank you'? Life isn't always a bed of roses but even in the sadness, pain, chaos or brokenness, there is often something for which to be thankful.

As a child, I used to sing a song at the church I attended. It was called 'Count your blessings' and the chorus goes like this,

*'Count your blessings, name them one by one;
Count your blessings, see what God has done;
Count your blessings, name them one by one,
and it will surprise you what the Lord has done.'*

May we – may you – be constantly surprised at God's goodness and faithfulness and thankful for all that He has done.

Crows, Rooks and Jackdaws

We often refer to large black birds as crows. But as many will know they might indeed be one of a number of similar looking birds all belonging to the corvid family. But at first glance they can seem a bit tricky to tell apart especially in winter when they can be seen flocking together.

But some have particular characteristics that can help identification. A jackdaw for instance couldn't stay quiet to save its life, seeming to be constantly calling its name 'jack, jack, jack', and usually in large groups.

Carrion Crows are more usually in small family groups; whilst rooks are very gregarious and unfailingly accompanied by jackdaws, with adult rooks having that greyish-white skin around the base of their bill. In the 17th century rooks were prized for their livers that were said to cure rickets.

Ravens are another even larger black bird that can now be seen flying over the village - usually singly or in pairs - and signalling their presence with a really hoarse 'old man's' croak, eagle like wings and a diamond shaped tail.

Magpies are another common member of the corvid family, although that wasn't always the case, when once their more occasional appearance, as Gillian recalls, would be greeted with a salute and "Good morning Mr Magpie, how are your wife and children", said for good luck. Jays that squawk are here too, and can often be distinguished by their white rump as they fly away.

'As the crow flies' is a term we still use for going straight ahead, and rooks and jackdaws can be seen passing over Willersey twice a day heading to and from their roost. In times gone by the evening flight overhead of these two birds was an indicator for agricultural workers to down tools and head for home and fireside comfort.

Helen was born in Sheffield and educated at Sheffield Girl's' High School. She was in the Voluntary Army Division as a nurse during the Second World War where she met my mother and was a bridesmaid at my parents wedding in 1947. I came along in 1948 and Helen was asked to be my godmother so she has been a large part of my life for seventy years.

She read music at Edinburgh university from 1947-50 and while there saw a horn in a music shop window and bought it with a loan from her father! She was a natural and went on to play it in the BBC Northern Ireland Orchestra in 1952 where she met Maureen McKeown, a violin player and they became firm friends. They moved together to play in the BBC Welsh Orchestra in 1955 before deciding to have a complete change and buy and run a guest house in Wingham, Kent, which they called Minstrels in 1959. However music was never far away and Helen worked freelance playing in ensembles and orchestras at various London venues including the Festival Hall, as well as teaching at the King's School and the Choir School in Canterbury.

In 1976 she retired from performing after a brain tumour operation and became an Associated Board Examiner travelling around the UK and abroad to places as far away as Australia and New Zealand and was a Festival Adjudicator in Canterbury. She and Maureen moved to Willersey in 1984 calling their house Minstrels again and blessed the day they moved to such a kind, caring village. Sadly Maureen became increasingly disabled and Helen looked after her magnificently with help from carers. She once told me that she hadn't slept one night away from Willersey for 13 years.

After Maureen's death in 2004, Helen aged 80, amazed me as she threw herself into village life once again and became friends with Pamela Baldwin who kept a watchful eye on her for me! She also let me know if Helen wasn't too well or had had a fall latterly.

She drove for the Cotswold North Volunteers taking people for hospital appointments and visited Yates Court in Evesham to give quizzes as she was always very keen to keep people's minds active. She herself enjoyed doing crosswords. To this end she started the 80 Club at home in Willersey; it's name speaks for itself! She was also a member of NADFAS in Evesham She was President of the Wednesday Club for 11 years. This is still going strong as the ones she coerced onto the committee are still on it! She belonged to and then ran two music groups at home for the U3A and was in the Historic Churches group. She paid for the pianos to be tuned in the church and the village hall annually in memory of Maureen and loved the village events like the music on the green.

She delivered the Village News in Willow Close for a while and sometimes gave me the job if I was visiting.

She supported the village shop, hairdresser and garage among other things and was extremely grateful to her neighbours who collected her paper, did some shopping Sam was a huge stalwart looking after her and Maureen for ? years. She began as a cleaner and became a carer and friend. put her bins out and in and picked her up when she fell as her balance became worse with age, having lost her hearing in one ear after her operation.

Thank you to the village she loved which I enjoyed visiting and meeting some of you.

**LOCAL WALKS WITH THE
COTSWOLDS VOLUNTARY WARDENS**
July 2018



Castlett Wood, Kineton, a brook and a river –Thursday 5th July - Moderate

A circular walk from Guiting Power which follows the Castlett brook through Castlett Wood before passing through the hamlet of Kineton. The walk briefly runs alongside the river Windrush before returning to Guiting Power. 2.5 hours: 5.5 miles.

Start: 10:00 am Guiting Power Village Hall car park (donations). Can be busy but also on street parking within the village. OS Map ref SP 095 246.

Literary Connections – Thursday 19th July - Moderate

The third of an occasional series of walks focusing on the literary figures who have visited the Cotswolds. 6 hours: 11 miles.

Start: 9:30 am Blockley Community Shop and Cafe. OS Map ref SP 164 349.

Tortoise, Grasshopper and who know what else... – Thursday 26th July - Moderate

Tortoise, grasshopper - and who knows what you will meet on this walk. It takes us through a number of woods, plantations, lanes and small paths around Guiting Power. Slopes and undulating terrain rather than hills. 5 hours: 9.5 miles.

Start: 10:00am Guiting Power Village Hall car park (donations). Can be busy but also on-street parking within the village. OS Map ref SP 095 246.

PLEASE use appropriate footwear as some walks may be steep and muddy in places. EASY - Length may vary but terrain is mainly flat (level); MODERATE - includes some hills and rough ground. STRENUOUS – may be rough underfoot and ascents and descents may be steep. We welcome guide and hearing dogs - sorry, others not allowed.

Walks are free although we do invite donations to help fund our conservation and improvement work.
