Pastoral Letter – August 2018

Time out!

"Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." (St Matthew's Gospel, chapter 11, verses 28-30, NRSV)

As I write, we are just a few days away from the end of the school term and the 2017/18 academic year (hear the collective expressions of exhaustion from many teachers and school staff!) Traditionally, this is the time of year when some people make time to 'get away from it all', either by going on holiday of by having the increasingly popular staycation, or holiday at home.

If you are about to head off for your holidays, I hope that you have a wonderful, safe and enjoyable time. But, even if you're not, may I encourage you to make space in your life for some 'time out'? As human beings we are, well, exactly that – human, not super-human! We need time and space to lay down everyday burdens and pressures and to recharge our batteries. Jesus modelled this in the gospels. His ministry (that is, his service of others and his work for God) was busy and, of course, important. 'Sheep Stare' and Murmurations

Starlings or 'Sheep Stare' as they are sometimes called in Gloucestershire on account of their habit of perching on the backs of sheep to feed off ticks, are much reduced in number these days. That said, perhaps you too have seen the flock of a hundred plus swirling around the village earlier in the year.

These thrush-sized birds are extremely social, often forming much larger flocks and feeding quickly in busy, squabbling groups. Although at first sight somewhat ordinary in appearance, close up, especially in spring, they are a deep iridescent purple, lavishly spangled and speckled. Quite the 'bobby-dazzler'.

They are also the best mimics of all British birds, with individuals having as many as twenty different sounds they can mimic which they mix up with their usual repertoire of clucks, wheezes and whistles.

The other feature for which starlings are renowned is murmurations a mass aerial stunt with often thousands of birds all swooping and diving in unison. It's completely breathtaking to witness. They gather and perform wheeling stunts before they roost for the night.

We think that starlings do it for many reasons. Grouping together offers safety in numbers – predators such as peregrine falcons find it hard to target one bird in the middle of a hypnotising flock of thousands. They also gather to keep warm at night and to exchange information such as good feeding areas. Who'd a thought it? So not such a dowdy bird after all.

<u>Glebe Land: protection for Upper Marbrook</u> <u>– and a new threat to Broadway</u>

Dear Friends,

I am pleased to be able to let you know that our Diocese of Gloucester has fulfilled Bishop Robert Springett's promise to protect Upper Marbrook, the ridge and furrow field next to the church, from development. With much legal work and a notional grant to the PCC by the Diocese we have established a long lease which will prevent any building on that land for 125 years.

It is important, at this time, to summarise the other progress we have made, as a parish, in protecting Willersey's glebe land and reducing overdevelopment:

- We persuaded the Diocese to rid itself of the infamous 'promoter' Gladman.
- With the removal of Gladman, we have been assured the Diocese is now committed to working only within the framework of the Local Plan, which identifies 'Terrify' as the only glebe land on which development can be considered.
- The Diocesan Board of Finance have undertaken to meet and consult with the Parish Council and the PCC before any application is submitted to enable consultation and input from the Council and villagers into any development that is pursued on Terrify.
- Ben Preece Smith, the Diocesan Secretary, accepts that the commitment to the above will not restrict the Parish from acting to oppose any such development.
- Bishop Rachel accepted that it was not appropriate for the Diocese to take and express an uncaring attitude to the impacts of any proposed development on glebe land on our Parish. Bishop Rachel has promised that she will not allow any Diocesan building development that would result in Willersey being 'over-housed'.


Thank you for your conspicuous support in achieving these important and positive developments.

Meanwhile, Broadway is faced with the proposal of another unwelcome housing development. Broadway is in the Diocese of Worcester which is known to be interested in imposing even more development on that parish, on top of the huge developments in progress. Willersey will need to support Broadway in its opposition to this unwelcome glebe land development, particularly because all these developments in both parishes result in even greater excessive demands on common infrastructure.

In Willersey, archaeological surveys have been undertaken on Terrify, to support a planning application by the Diocese. The Parish Council will take the lead in opposing this and will be able to count on the PCC and parishioners for support in this. Whilst it is regrettable that the Diocese has continued to explore land development in our village as it already undergoes significant developments, I am grateful to Bishop Rachel and Ben Preece Smith for their concessions and their efforts to re-establish positive relations between the Diocese and its Parish of Saint Peter's, Willersey with Saintbury.

We must hope that both our Bishop of Gloucester and the Bishop of Worcester come to recognise the damage that their dioceses' conspicuous acquisitiveness does to the Church's reputation and to God's Mission, in our parishes and far beyond.

A lengthy walk over downs, through valleys and woods with a focus on a latterday philanthropist.

Start: 9:30 am Hawling outside Methodist church, or on gravel outside farm. OS Map ref SP 067 231.

The Warden's Hill Climb – Wednesday 29th August - Moderate

A novel route following the Winchcombe Way down to Gotherington station, pass Prescott Hill Climb course and then back up to the Common.

3 hours: 6 miles.

Start: 10:00 am Cleeve Hill Quarry car park – turn off B4632 at the summit signposted to Golf Club, up narrow road over cattle grid, left and right into car park.

OS Map ref SO 989 272.

PLEASE use appropriate footwear as some walks may be steep and muddy in places. EASY - Length may vary but terrain is mainly flat (level); MODERATE - includes some hills and rough ground. STRENUOUS – may be rough underfoot and ascents and descents may be steep. We welcome guide and hearing dogs - sorry, others not allowed.

Walks are free although we do invite donations to help fund our conservation and improvement work.
