PASTORAL LETTER – DECEMBER 2018

I realise that this is going to make me sound old (!) but it struck me recently that, as a child, our means of communication were, in essence, limited to the telephone, letters/cards/postcards and, of course, face-to-face visits and meetings. Now, in addition to the methods above (all of which work perfectly well, by the way!) we have email, texts, Skype, Facebook, Twitter, Snapchat, WhatsApp, Tumblr, Instagram, Viber, Pinterest, etc. The list goes on. And on. And on. Yet, despite the many ways of being able to communicate with one another, there is a huge amount of research to suggest that many in our society feel increasingly lonely. A survey by the Mental Health Foundation in 2015 revealed that one in ten people in Britain 'feels lonely often' and that '48% of people think we're getting lonelier in general'. We are reminded time and again of the need for *meaningful* communication.

Perhaps you've never thought about it like this before, but Christmas is really about God's desire to communicate meaningfully with us. This desire to communicate has always been central to the nature and character of God. God has spoken, and still speaks, in many ways, such as through the Bible, through family and friends, through the beauty and wonder of his creation, through the situations and circumstances that we find ourselves in, to name but a few. What is it, then, that God wants to communicate? What is the *true* message of Christmas? It is this: God longs for *each one of us* to know – without any doubt – his deep, unchanging and unfailing love for us – for *you* and for *me*. At Christmas, we are reminded that God's desire to communicate how much each one of us means to him is so great that he sent his Son, Jesus Christ, into the world to live among us, to show, in action, the height, depth, length and breadth of his love for us, and to save us from our sins.

Whether Christmas is something that you look forward to all year, or something that you dread because it is a painful or lonely time, I pray that you will hear God speaking to you afresh this year about how loved *you are*. If you're in any doubt about that, why not come along to a Christmas service? Then, in spirit, you can follow the example of the wise men, who gazed in wonder at God with us,

'When the wise men saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.' (NRSV)





Gloucester Diocese Remembers, 1914-1918

We attended the Centenary Remembrance Service at Gloucester Cathedral on Sunday 11th November, on behalf of our parish. This was held in the afternoon, after our parish's Remembrance Service at Saint Peter's and the dedication of the parish memorial bench, procured and sited on Sawpit Green by our Parish Council.

We were impressed by the smart, young cadets who were there to pay their respects. In a powerful and moving service we learnt that the 800 members of the congregation were outnumbered, ten to one, by the 8,000 servicemen from the Gloucester Diocese who lost their lives in that war. It had taken seven and a half hours to read out their names on BBC Radio Gloucestershire, prior to the service.

It was an honour and an unforgettable experience to represent our parish in remembering our Fallen and those who gave their lives from the rest of the Diocese at this solemn and meaningful Act of Remembrance.

We do hope that you will be able to come to these joint services which give more joy to everyone.










Christmas Eve Carol Singing



Making Space for Nature

Gardens have come to play an increasingly important role for British wildlife; and they cover a greater area of land than all of the UK's national nature reserves put together.

Quite a sobering thought and responsibility when you consider the birds and insects that have been lost to us in recent years and those that are currently seriously threatened. Interestingly, UK bird food sales exceed $\pounds 200$ million annually - more than the rest of Europe combined. But taken as a whole, our birds and insects are seriously threatened by the balance of current land use and habitat loss.

Clearly our gardens are not the whole solution to turning the tide, but they are pretty important and can make a real and significant difference.

Those who already garden with butterflies, moths and bees in mind by planting nectar plants such as lavender, verbena and buddleia have the added bonus of watching these wonderful creatures close up. Thyme that has gone to seed is another fantastic draw for late summer bees.

Finding a space even for a small garden pond is a guaranteed magnet for frogs, toads, newts, dragon and damsel flies. It's a kind of magic - create the water and they just seem to come.

As many will testify, there's no certainty that putting up a bird box will always attract 'new neighbours'; but when it works - wow, what a return. Now is a good time to put them up, or move so far unused boxes, for local birds to check out and see if it's the 'des res' they've been waiting for.

Birds and insects in particular need our help; but we need them too, as it's been powerfully demonstrated that they are important for our own mental health and general well-being. Gardening with nature in mind makes absolute sense and is easier than we might think.

Making space for nature really is a win/win.
