‘O Lord, our Lord, your majestic name fills the earth! When I look at the night sky and see the work of your fingers – the moon and the stars you set in place – what are mere mortals that you should think about them, human beings that you should care for them?’ (NLT)

By the time that you read this, many of us will have celebrated, on 20th July, the 50th anniversary of astronauts Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin being the first human beings to land and walk on the surface of the moon. I say ‘most of us’ because there are conspiracy theorists who still believe that the whole episode was a sham (what about those shadows and that flag?) The descriptions, by Armstrong and Aldrin, of what it was like to view the earth from the moon and, more than that, of the profound and life-changing impact that the entire experience had on them and subsequent astronauts, lead me to believe that it really did happen.

What humankind has been – and is – able to achieve is both profoundly inspiring and deeply troubling. However, the lunar landings, and our continued exploration of space, are, ultimately, an exemplar of what is possible when human beings from all nations work together *for the common good* and this should inspire each of us. I find myself especially inspired by words written by another astronaut, James Irwin. Irwin was the pilot for Apollo 15 and the eighth person to walk on the moon. In a book that he published after his adventure, he wrote,

‘The entire space achievement is put in proper perspective when one realises that God walking on the earth is more important than man walking on the moon. I believe that God walked on the earth 2,000 years ago in the person of Jesus Christ.’

Such a statement blows out of the water the myth that serious science and serious faith are incompatible! It also reveals a deep humility.

I wonder if the words from Psalm 8, which I quoted at the start of my letter, were in Irwin’s mind when he wrote the words above?

Productive ways to solve the problem:

Representing the problem *visually* leads to a fairly obvious solution. Visualize the path of the monk ascending the mountain, starting at dawn, and his path descending the mountain, also starting at dawn. Windrush, Wardens Way Circular – Walk 1 – Thursday 8th August - Moderate

Thinking about the problem in mathematical terms, or in terms of rates and distances will most likely be unproductive.

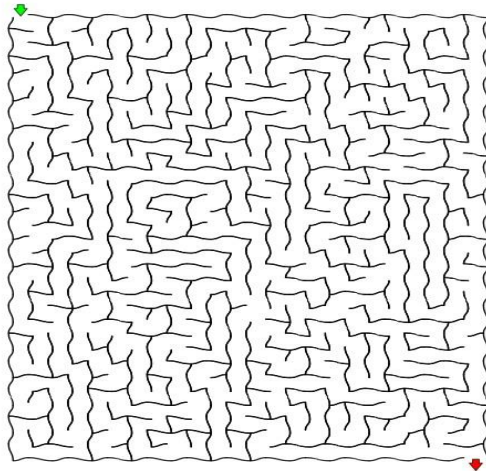

Nature Box

Field Edges and Rough Places



It is probably fair to say that some farmers get a bad press for adopting intensive farming methods that leave little room for nature.

Whilst this is clearly a major problem that in some locations adversely affects a wide range of wildlife - particularly insects - which in turn adds to the steep decline in the numbers of farmland birds and mammals, this is not the case everywhere. An increasing number of farmers are ensuring that there are sufficiently wide field edges left undisturbed for wildlife, that the timing of hedge cutting provides good nesting habitat, and many other particularly innovations such as uncultivated patches in crop fields for threatened skylarks to rear their young. No doubt a tricky balancing act when a farmer's productivity and personal income need to be considered.

Some of the immediate countryside surrounding Willersey, like the disused railway track bed, benefits our wildlife with a degree of untidiness, providing space for wild flowers, weeds and grasses to support insect life, and habitat for wood mice and voles - an important part of the food chain for owls, kestrels and buzzards. A similar contribution can be made when we leave some of our own garden space slightly wild and unkempt, contrasting with the current fashion for close cropped lawns, hard standing and gravel that offers little for wildlife. As we have come to learn, our gardens across the country are offering a vital wildlife sanctuary greater in size than all of the National Parks put together. Note to self: time to be a little less neat and tidy?

And, while most of us aren't looking, our swifts are already quietly slipping away returning to Sub-Saharan Africa.
