‘Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God.’ Romans, chapter 15, verse 7 (NRSV)

Most years, for many years now, Ros, the dogs and I have headed to the far north of Scotland for our main holiday. I first went to the area where we stay back in 1989. Ros and I first went there together in 2004. It has become a special place for us – a little bit of ‘heaven on earth’.

When in the far north, we worship at Dornoch Cathedral, a place where, over the years, we have been made to feel part of the family. We’re always remembered, always welcomed (with, literally, open arms) and always made to feel that we belong. I realised recently that those who worship there week in and week out are striving to make real the welcome expressed in a sign that hangs on the main door of the Cathedral. The sign reads:

‘Welcome to those who are single, married, divorced, gay, straight, confused, filthy rich, comfortable or dirt poor.

Welcome if you can sing like Pavarotti or can’t sing a note.

Welcome if you’re just browsing, just woken up or just got out of prison.

Welcome if you’re still in recovery or still addicted.

Welcome to those who work too hard, aren’t in paid work at the moment or who have retired from work.

Welcome to those who don’t know anything about Church and are only here because Grandma is in town and wanted to visit the Cathedral.

Welcome to those who could use a prayer right now, those who have had religion shoved down their throat as a kid and those who live locally but have never come in before.

We don’t care if you’re more Christian than the Archbishop of Canterbury, or haven’t been in Church since little Jimmy’s christening.

We welcome tourists, seekers and doubters, saints and sinners, regulars, visitors, friends and strangers.’

What a generous welcome! There are numerous variations of this sign that I’ve seen over the years. Some might think that such signs are trite or even unnecessary but, to me, they are an important reminder that Christ welcomes into his presence *everyone* who would come to him and does so with amazing and abundant generosity *because he loves each and every one of us.*

Those of you who have attended services that I've led will often hear me say in my words of welcome, "Come just as you are and know that you're loved, accepted and welcome". I say those words because I believe them to be true, because I believe that that is how God welcomes us and because, as St Paul reminds us, that is how we are called to welcome others. What a privilege to show and share Christ's welcome in all of the places where God has called us to be.

**LOCAL WALKS WITH THE
COTSWOLDS VOLUNTARY WARDENS
September 2019**



**Woods, Wolds and a Prophetess – Tuesday 3rd
September - Moderate**

This varied walk takes us through three historic villages and across the Wolds which provide lovely views across the North Cotswolds. We walk through woodlands and meadows which should be rich in flora and fauna at the time of our walk. Bring a packed lunch. 5.5 hours: 11 miles.

Start: 10.00 am Batsford Arboretum car park. OS Map ref: SP 181 334.

**Fame & Fortune: exploring beyond Moreton in Marsh – Thursday 5th
September - Easy**

This walk offers the chance to view the majestic house of the famous Mitford family, near Bourton-on-the-Hill. Walking towards Longborough, we pass Sezincote and find out about the history of the house and family. We return to Moreton via the hidden duck pond. Bring coffee/snacks. 3 hours: 6 miles.

Start: 10.00 am Moreton in Marsh war memorial. Long term car park by station & on streets.

**Windrush, Wardens Way Circular – Walk 2 – Tuesday 10th September -
Moderate**

The second in a series of circular walks along the Wardens & Windrush Way. From Naunton, we climb out of the valley to Aylworth and Guiting Power. We pick up the Wardens Way and pass Guiting's Norman church and Naunton's unusual sun dials. Bring refreshments. 4 hours: 6.5 miles.

Start: 10.00 am Park in Naunton village & meet at the Black Horse pub. OS Map ref: SP 118 234.

Environmentally Friendly Farming – Tuesday 17th September - Moderate

An undulating walk with one short steep climb on the private tracks, headlands and woods of Guiting Manor Farm where the aim is to farm with wildlife habitat in mind. See how man and nature benefit whilst enjoying superb views of the Cotswold landscape. Bring a drink/snack. 3.5 hours: 6 miles.

Start: 10.00 am Guiting Manor Farm. Park in field opposite farm on left hand side as you approach from Winchcombe. OS Map ref: SP 088 252.

Nature Box - (Sea) gulls

There seems to be an acceptance that **seagulls** should be referred to as **gulls** as they are now to be found inland for much of the year.

Gulls have for a long time been present inland during winter time, often seen when following the plough for tasty uncovered morsels. But nowadays they are more regularly observed throughout the year, encouraged by changes in life style with fast foods and rubbish tips (oops - recycling centres) which offer even richer pickings. Consequently gulls have become quite adept and opportunistic at living along side us, as I can testify with a piece of chicken being plucked off my plate during a leisurely outdoor lunch. Even Prime Minister David Cameron (remember him?) had a ham sandwich snatched on a seaside holiday.

Willersey has its fair share of gulls: herring gulls and black backed gulls mainly. Gulls can be quite tricky to tell apart as plumage varies with immature birds. Black headed gulls are more easily recognised, although when looked at closely the head is actually a chocolate brown and then only during the summer months. Still, identification isn't everything. Sometimes just watching them wheeling in the sky, adding to what we see locally, can be more rewarding than knowing exactly what species we are looking at.

And, while most of us aren't looking our swallows are busy gathering together to follow the swifts and head to Africa.
