**Cotswold District Council** is calling on residents to give their views on proposed changes to its Council Tax Reduction Scheme.

The Council has launched a consultation which runs until Friday 15<sup>th</sup> November and is open to all residents in the district, not just those in receipt of support. If agreed, the changes would come into effect on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2020. Changes proposed include:

- Introducing a new income banded scheme to take account of different groups from single occupants to couples and families with children.
- Introducing an 'extended period' of up to eight weeks to support the transition of households whose increased income sees them move into higher banding.
- Removal of the two child limit to help larger families have more disposable income
- Introducing an increase to the maximum amount of savings claimants can have, from £6,001 to £10,000.

Cllr Mike Evely, Deputy Leader of Cotswold District Council and Cabinet Member for Finance, said: "This consultation is vital to understand the views not just of those who rely on Council Tax support, but also the wider communities we serve. I'd encourage anyone who can spare a few moments to fill out the survey and help us to ensure any changes made best suit the needs of residents." Following the consultation, a report will be considered by councillors before a decision is made.

### Dog regulations for the Recreation Ground

The Parish Council thanks those residents who have responded to the consultation regarding dog access to the ground.

The conclusions are that although residents believe most dogs are friendly they recognise that some may not be, and many people or children find a dog running towards them and possibly jumping or barking to be an alarming experience.

Parents of children using the playground do not believe that dogs should be allowed in this area. Although faeces is picked up, urine is not.

Those who use the park for exercise particularly football, are concerned that dog faeces are not picked up.

The ground is a convenient exercise area for dog owners living close by.

Following this consultation the Parish Council have decided that the best way of reconciling the interests of dog walkers, footballers, parents and other users, is that in future dogs will be permitted in the ground but only if they are kept on a lead at all times.

This will take effect from November 1<sup>st</sup> and appropriate notices will be erected at entrances to the ground.

**COTSWOLDS VOLUNTARY WARDENS**  
November 2019



**Windrush, Wardens Way Circular – Walk 4 –  
Tuesday 5<sup>th</sup> November - Moderate**

The last in a series of four circular walks encompassing the Windrush and Wardens Way.

We will leave Winchcombe on the Windrush Way and return via the Wardens Way. Hopefully we will get lovely views down the Sudeley valley. Bring a packed lunch. 4.5 hours: 8 miles.

Start: 10.00 am Winchcombe Back lane car park (£1 all day) OS Map ref: SP 024 285.

**Hidcote Hike – Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> November - Strenuous**

An excellent walk, much of the trail being stone tracks. We start at Hidcote, which will be closed, and head for Chipping Campden and Ebrington passing the large mansion style house of Foxcote. End with glorious views over Ilmington and a scenic descent to Hidcote. Bring a snack and a packed lunch. 5 hours: 10 miles.

Start: 10.00 am Hidcote NT car park. OS Map ref: SP 176 428.

**Hills and Churches around Oxenton Hill – 8<sup>th</sup> November – Moderate**

A hilly walk passing the churches around Oxenton and Crane Hills. Great views on a clear day. Please bring a drink/snack. 3 hours: 6 miles.

Start: 10.00 am Park carefully in Alstone village. Meet at St Margaret's church. OS Map ref: SO 983 325.

**Power around Guiting – Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> November - Moderate**

This circular walk starts at the ancient village of Guiting Power. We climb up the Cotswold Hills to get views to the north and west (weather permitting). Dropping down into the river valley, we come to the village of Naunton with its famous dovecote. Bring drinks and a snack. 3 hours: 6 miles.

Start: 10.00 am Guiting Power village car park (donation) OS Map ref: SP 094 246.

**A Three Village Walk – 19<sup>th</sup> November - Strenuous**

A walk with several ascents but no significant climbs. We visit the villages of Cold Aston (also known as Aston Blanc), Turkdean and Notgrove via the Macmillan Way, Diamond Way and Gloucestershire Way. Refreshments available after the walk in The Plough, Cold Aston. 3 hours: 6.5 miles.

Start: 10.00 am Village green, Cold Aston. OS Map ref: SP 129 197.

PLEASE use appropriate footwear as some walks may be steep and muddy in places. EASY - Length may vary but terrain is mainly flat (level); MODERATE - includes some hills and rough ground. STRENUOUS – may be rough underfoot and ascents and descents may be steep. We welcome guide and hearing dogs - sorry, others not allowed.

## Nature Box



### Flocks of Convenience

Winter migration is now well underway with great flocks of birds arriving having successfully navigated their lengthy journeys.

Sticking together has obvious benefits for birds such as geese, swans and waders, usually travelling in a 'V' formation to conserve energy, taking it in turns to be at the front; although nobody has yet discovered how they decide who is to lead and what signals a change of leader.

Although we are unlikely to see such spectacular arrivals over Willersey, there will be many other smaller birds migrating through the area and travelling together helps in identifying suitable landfall, finding food and of course extra pairs of eyes to watch for predators. Flocks of redwing and fieldfare regularly arrive in and around the village, stopping to feed and rest before perhaps moving on. Such migratory birds often fly at night for extra safety, and can be heard flying overhead in the dark calling to each other. Although it is now known that peregrine falcons have become adept at catching migrating birds at night in urban areas where there is significant street lighting.

Our tits and finches will form large mixed groups of convenience too at this time, and can be seen busily using feeders and flitting through our gardens.

*And, while most of us aren't looking, our hedgehogs will soon be bedding down and hibernating for the winter.*

Gwen told us that she was born in London and lived there until the age of 9 when war was declared. She was one of the many children who were immediately evacuated and with her mother was sent to Northampton where the conditions they had to live in were not good. After a while, as London was not being bombed they returned to their home. Then bombing started in earnest and they came to Broadway, which she said was like a picture postcard village. They were very happy here and she said she had a very good education, first in Broadway School, then Prince Henry's Grammar School in Evesham. Her stories brought back many memories to our members.

On 9th October Jan Long came to talk to us about her work with the British Council. Not a lot is known about this Council which was formed in 1934 and opened offices and branches all over the world, to promote British Trade abroad. It has offices in America, North Africa, Sub Sahara, East Asia, Russia and many other countries. Jan had lived in many foreign countries as a child as her father was in the forces, and had also worked in several of them during her 25 years with the Council. Her talk was very informative and amusing, illustrated by pictures of the places she had worked in and some of the famous people she had met.

## Parish Safeguarding Update

Every parish in the Vale and Cotswold Edge Team takes seriously its safeguarding responsibilities and I thought it might be helpful if I gave you an update of what is happening nationally and locally in the Church.

January saw the publication of the 'Parish Safeguarding Handbook', designed to support day-to-day safeguarding work for all parishes working with children, young people or vulnerable adults.

Then, the House of Bishops produced a 'Promoting a Safer Church' safeguarding policy statement. The church councils of each church have formally agreed to adopt this document, which will be displayed outside each church. This, along with other documents on display, gives details of each Parish Safeguarding Officer. Contact numbers are also provided for passing on concerns about abuse of children, vulnerable adults and reporting modern slavery. The latest version of all the Church of England safeguarding documents can be viewed at <http://www.churchofengland.org/safeguarding>

Awareness of safeguarding issues applies to all aspects of church life, especially to those in the Church who are at risk of being alone with a child or vulnerable adult. As a minimum, these people are required to complete a course covering basic safeguarding requirements. For example, our Church bell-ringers have recently completed this course.

The annual version of the church's safeguarding checklist has just been completed and submitted to the Diocese of Gloucester for each of the parishes across the Team. This aims to ensure that we have checks in place and identify areas where more work needs doing.

I hope this update is helpful and gives you assurance of our ongoing commitment to ensuring the safety and wellbeing of all those who have contact, however limited, with the Church.
