## **PASTORAL LETTER – DECEMBER 2019**

Are you feeling Christmassy yet, I wonder? Or, is your heart sinking further and further towards your boots as December 25<sup>th</sup> draws closer? Are you filled with joyful anticipation of the Season yet, or is it that awful sense of dread that consumes you?

I met someone recently who said how sad they find it that Christmas no longer feels like it did when they were younger. Their comment got me thinking. Why is it that Christmas no longer feels as special for some as once it did? The answer to that question is complex, of course, but, in a nutshell, it may well be something to do with our collective failure to stop and remember what it is that we're actually celebrating! In a year that has seen so much turmoil and unrest in the life of our nation, the *true message of Christmas* is as fresh, delighting, efficacious, life-changing and needed as it ever was. The prophet Isaiah, writing some 700 years before Jesus Christ was born, put it like this:

*'The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness – on them light has shined...'*

*For a child has been born to us, a son given to us; authority rests on his shoulders;*

*and he is named Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.'* *Isaiah, Chapter 9, verse 2 & 6 (NRSV)*

This is what we're actually celebrating – the birth of our Saviour and the Saviour of the world, Jesus Christ – and it's the reason why, amongst my busyness, I shall still make time to mark the moment in time that changed the world, my life and the life of every follower of that new-born King of kings, forever. In Christ, our darkness and the darkness of the world around us, is obliterated by his marvellous and radiant light. In Christ, God's own and only Son, we have one rooting for us who is wonderful, mighty, everlasting and the bringer of a peace that is like nothing the world can give.

As well as the many who love Christmas, I know that, for some, it's a time of year that they find downright difficult. Whichever camp you belong to, I invite you to come to a carol service or one of our

Christmas services. Come, just as you are, knowing that you're loved, accepted and welcome. Come, with your joys and sorrows, your hopes and dreams, your pain and brokenness, and discover afresh, or the first time, the height, depth, length and breadth of God's love for you, revealed uniquely in and through his Son, Jesus Christ.

Ros and I both wish you a blessed and peaceful Christmas.

Our speaker on 23rd October was David Chatterley, showing us some of his collection of Victorian Brass Needle Cases. At first it seemed that there could not be a lot to say about a packet of needles - but David produced some amazing examples of cases that were made in the Victorian era. There were brass cases in the shape of Hedgehogs, a walnut, clock, wheelbarrow, bird, and many more. The workmanship of these cases was amazing. Some of the needles were so fine and the eyes so tiny one wondered how people managed to thread them, especially as the light would not have been very good. These cases, which would have sold for a few pennies in Victorian times, are now sold for hundreds, sometimes, thousands of pounds.

On 6th November Roger Butler brought sunshine into the hall on a very grey and gloomy day, with his slides of Morocco. We visited Marrakech, Taroudant, The Atlas Mountains and Sahara Desert. Visited the Medinas and markets and isolated villages high in the mountains. It was like a step back into biblical times.

We are looking forward to hearing the children from the village school on 20th November and remembering the Swinging 60's on 4th December. Our meetings will start again on 22nd January, 2020 with Members Day when Roger Batham will talk about the history of the club.

We leave the valley and ascend the scarp slope, passing historic sites along the way, to enjoy airy views from the Salt Way. We then head towards Hailes before returning to Winchcombe in time for lunch. 3 hours: 6 miles.

#### A Polar Expedition – Monday 20<sup>th</sup> January - Moderate

A walk through some of the remoter parts of the North Cotswolds, visiting the monument that gives this walk its name and returning through Longborough and past Sezincote House. Please bring a packed lunch. 5.5 hours: 10.5 miles.

PLEASE use appropriate footwear as some walks may be steep and muddy in places. EASY - Length may vary but terrain is mainly flat (level); MODERATE - includes some hills and rough ground. STRENUOUS – may be rough underfoot and ascents and descents may be steep. We welcome guide and hearing dogs - sorry, others not allowed.

### Village Hall Refurbishment

As many of you know the Village Hall Committee had a survey carried out on the hall in 2016 which highlighted problems with the roof, the external cladding, the lack of insulation and many other areas which need upgrading to make the hall more energy efficient and meet with the latest regulations needed for such buildings.

The intention therefore is to refurbish the building according to the plans that have been displayed in the hall, starting next Easter, using a combination of money due to the village as a result of housing developments and a loan from the Government financed by a modest increase in council tax. Further detailed information about what is proposed will be published in December and a public meeting will be held in January.

## Points of Interest from the Parochial Church Council Meeting, 4 November 2019.

There was a vote of thanks to all who participated in the Autumn cleaning session in October. Refurbishment of the Vestry and spot remedial works to the lime washed walls in the interior of the church are in progress. The floor cupboards in the Vestry have been refurbished and stabilised and shelving installed.

Due to the unusually wet Autumn, it has not been possible to undertake the preparation and sowing of the wild flower meadow areas in Saintbury Churchyard in 2019. Some donations have been received and RMW is preparing a grant application to submit to a Diocesan Scheme.

It was agreed that the Saintbury War Memorial will be retained as an ancient monument, given that it has been inspected by a stonemason and found to be stable, and that the inscriptions and names of the Fallen will be displayed in a suitably permanent display within Saint Nicholas' Church, subject to the Churches Conservation Trust's agreement.

There has been an increase in cost of publication of the Village News to cover the increased circulation due to the growth of the village. Ways of working to support these increased costs were agreed.

Saint Peter's Safeguarding Policy has been updated and will be finalised and displayed in the church.

With 2019 being the 175th Anniversary of the founding of Willersey (Church of England Controlled) School, Bishop Rachel has graciously accepted the Churchwarden's invitation to visit our Parish on Tuesday 26 November to bless the School's commemorative mosaic, witness the Christian education our Parish's children receive and lead a service of Holy Communion in the church.

It was agreed that fundraising will need to focus on supporting the increasing costs of keeping Saint Peter's operational. The PCC will take an annual approach, looking at each year's forecast annual income and typical operating costs/outgoings to identify the the figure as the annual target for a managed programme of fund-raising.

Sadly, it had been necessary to postpone the joint quiz with the Methodist Church due to organiser ill-health.

Christmas Tree Festival: Organisations will decorate trees in the church. These will be available for the public to view on 21 December with seasonal refreshments. Also, the Nativity Trail will be taking place again this year.

## **Nature Box**



**Ever thought about putting up a bird nest box? Well now is a perfect time. Not only are many birds checking out likely sites for next spring, but also looking for a winter weather bolt hole.**

**If you have been disappointed because a nest box has not been occupied, try moving it. One unused nest box moved last year almost immediately attracted a pair of tits who bred successfully.**

**Shop bought bird boxes usually come with some advice on the packaging but here are a few tried and tested tips.**

- **Consider choosing a box suitable for blue tits or great tits as they are more readily used.**
- **Generally, positioned facing north or east is best.**
- **Definitely not south - too hot, so save for your deckchair!**
- **Place your nest box 2-4 metres off the ground.**
- **Make sure that the birds have a clear flight path to the nest box without any clutter directly in front of the entrance.**
- **Keep away from feeders - visiting birds may disturb nesting.**

**Of course, there is no guarantee that your carefully positioned bird box will be used, but when you are successful it's a real treat to watch the nesting activity: nest building, feeding of young and fledging. A brilliant time waster.**

***And, while most of us aren't looking, young tawny owls are noisily seeking a mate and nest site away from mum and dad.***
