PASTORAL LETTER – APRIL 2020

**‘God is our refuge and strength,
always ready to help in times of trouble.
So we will not fear when earthquakes come
and the mountains crumble into the sea.
Let the oceans roar and foam.**

**Let the mountains tremble as the waters surge!
The God of Heaven’s Armies is here among us;
God...is our fortress.’**

Words from Psalm 46 (New Living Translation)

The person who wrote Psalm 46, so many thousands of years ago, was living in, and knew, difficult times – times that were frightening, times when everything that was known, familiar and stable appeared to be falling apart around him. The world, as he knew it, was changing, almost beyond recognition. Now, Coronavirus, a word that few of us had even heard of until a few weeks ago, is having a similar effect on our lives, our families and friends, our society, the UK and, indeed, much of the planet. These are unsettling and unnerving times.

In his unsettling and unnerving times, the writer of Psalm 46 was able to say confidently, ‘So we will not fear when earthquakes come and the mountains crumble into the sea’. How, and why, was he able to say that with such surety? The answer is at the start and end of the words that I quoted above, ‘God is our refuge and strength, always ready to help in times of trouble. The God of Heaven’s Armies is here among us; God...is our fortress.’ God *is* among us and is a safe place, a place of refuge, no matter what is going on around us.

I am very sorry to tell you that we have had to **suspend all public Worship services at Saint Peter’s**, on the instructions of the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, until further notice. This will be the situation in all Church of England parishes. Be assured that the Church of England, nationally and locally, is most definitely not “shutting up shop”. Our Parish Church of Saint Peter will be open daily to offer a space of peace, reflection and sanctuary. We are exploring a whole range of ways to pray and worship, using online resources, and we will publish these in next month’s Village News.

Ever since I came to these wonderful parishes and communities, almost three years ago now, I have made the point passionately that, regardless of whether or not you come to church, and whatever you believe, struggle to believe or don't believe, I, and the church community, are here for you. I want, especially, to reiterate that now. If there is *anything* – practical or pastoral – that we can do to support you in the difficult days, weeks and months ahead, please be in touch. This copy of the *Village News* focuses on the Coronavirus. I know that many people will be feeling fearful and isolated and I am pleased that this issue of the *News* includes information on the Support Group that our parish organisations and other volunteers have set up to provide essential support for anyone in need of help during this emergency. Having got to know, and come to love, these communities, I know that everyone will do whatever they can to help all those who are affected by Coronavirus.

On 12th April, one way or another, Christians across the world will celebrate Easter, Christ's glorious and life-changing resurrection from the dead. From the bleakness of the cross come salvation, hope and life-eternal to all who believe. Even on the darkest of days, the resurrection of Jesus is a reminder that hope, love and light will *always* conquer hopelessness, hate and the darkness of the present moment.

There are some simple but effective things we can all do to help: Making sure they have enough food and other general supplies to cover a few days - **there is no need to panic buy though**

- Walking their dog, picking up a prescription, putting out their bins or taking in a parcel
- Phoning, Skyping or Facetime them so they can see a friendly face, helping to reduce their isolation
- Sharing child care or other caring responsibilities
- Checking if any of their planned appointments have been cancelled before they travel
- Making sure they have some simple recipes to hand, if they are not the normal chef or have done some batch cooking for the freezer

A Brush with Nature

One evening whilst walking home through the village I turned a corner and came face to face with a fox. It is hard to say which of us was more surprised. Despite our closeness neither of us moved for what seemed like an age, before the handsome young fox lost interest, turned and sauntered off, only stopping briefly to take one last seemingly bemused look at me.

Many of us, probably all of us if we think about it, can conjure up a similar memory - *a meaningful brush with nature* - be it mammal, bird or perhaps a particularly striking insect. Even the most mundane creatures can suddenly look amazing when seen close up.

Wildlife loss affecting bees - vital crop pollinators - has been much in the news, and clearly something that we should be really concerned about. But maintaining opportunities for everyday encounters with all our wildlife, however fleeting, matters too. In our increasingly busy and materially driven lives such moments are perhaps even more important than ever.

Without wildlife, landscape is merely background (*) .

And whilst most of us aren't looking 'our' swallows, that have had to battle through particularly severe Saharan sandstorms in returning to Willersey this year, will, fingers crossed, be arriving in early April.

Dear Friends,

COVID-19 Support Group: As you can see from the notice above on page 3, parish organisations and enthusiastic volunteers have formed a group to provide essential, practical support to parishioners of Willersey with Saintbury who are isolated, incapacitated or in need of help for the duration of this virus outbreak. Our Call Centre number is 0330 1070 300 / Email: willerseycovid19@gmail.com

The types of support you may need if you are self-isolating or ill might include:

- Collecting shopping, supplies, prescriptions
- Putting out / returning bins
- Dog walking
- Sourcing specialist advice
– or just getting a phone call or a visit for a friendly chat, whilst maintaining social distancing, if you feel isolated or want the reassurance of having established contact before you actually have any other need.

Neighbours' support: Within our friendly parish, it is **even better if neighbour can support neighbour** in those same ways, because you're closer at hand and will be helping to spread the load. So, please reach out to your neighbours, if you can, remembering to take care to avoid spreading infection and maintaining social distancing.

Essential suppliers and deliveries: There is no national shortage of food and other essentials, nor is there likely to be. To arrange essential deliveries of supplies, shopping and prescriptions to your home and for information on products on sale in the parish we have provided some information on suitable local suppliers and outlets in this issue of the Village News.

Tradesmen: As ever, this Village News includes advertisements for our local tradesmen, if you have any plumbing, electrical or structural problems.

Information on self-isolation and avoiding contracting COVID-19 from Gloucestershire County Council follows this letter. But it is important keep up to date with information as it develops, as published in newspapers and on the radio and television. 

COVID-19 Update from Gloucestershire County Council

18th March 2020

Updated guidance called '[Staying at Home](https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/covid-19-stay-at-home-guidance)' is now available online at www.gov.uk/government/publications/covid-19-stay-at-home-guidance.

The main messages are:

- if you live alone and you have symptoms of coronavirus illness (COVID-19), however mild, stay at home for **7 days** from when your symptoms started.
- if you live with others and you or one of them have symptoms of coronavirus, then all household members must stay at home and not leave the house for **14 days**. The 14-day period starts from the day when the first person in the house became ill
- it is likely that people living within a household will infect each other or be infected already. Staying at home for 14 days will greatly reduce the overall amount of infection the household could pass on to others in the community.
- for anyone in the household who starts displaying symptoms, they need to stay at home for 7 days from when the symptoms appeared, regardless of what day they are on in the original 14-day isolation period.
- if you can, move any vulnerable individuals (such as the elderly and those with underlying health conditions) out of your home, to stay with friends or family for the duration of the home isolation period.
- if you cannot move vulnerable people out of your home, stay away from them as much as possible.
- if you have coronavirus symptoms:
 - do **not** go to a GP surgery, pharmacy or hospital
 - you do not need to contact 111 to tell them you're staying at home
 - testing for coronavirus is not needed if you're staying at home
- plan ahead and ask others for help to ensure that you can successfully stay at home and consider what can be done for vulnerable people in the household
- ask your employer, friends and family to help you to get the things you need to stay at home
- wash your hands regularly for 20 seconds, each time using soap and water, or use hand sanitiser
- if you feel you cannot cope with your symptoms at home, or your condition gets worse, or your symptoms do not get better after 7 days, then use the [NHS 111 online](#) coronavirus service. If you do not have internet access, call NHS 111. For a medical emergency dial 999

Saint Peter's Church Tower and Other Work

Saint Peter's Parochial Church Council has appointed Q&M Ltd of Gloucester to undertake the re-cladding of Saint Peter's Church tower roof. The works will start in early July and be completed by the end of August 2020. They will involve scaffolding all the way round and to the top of the tower. We intend to make use of this to get other work done, like spot replacement of the limited number of tiles that are missing in the roofs of the Nave and North and South Transepts.

Chris Ingles will be repairing a section of dry-stone wall that has collapsed on the south side of Saint Peter's and using this as an opportunity to train new wall builders to keep that ancient skill alive in the Cotswolds.
