It is, perhaps, a sign of the times that when a small parcel arrived unexpectedly at the Vicarage recently, it was the cause of much excitement. Once I had convinced Ros that I hadn't been making clandestine book purchases (this has been known to happen!), I opened the parcel to discover this:



It was a timely reminder, and a blessing, and came from a friend whom I first met in 1987, when I worked for Lloyds Bank. Angela is a talented crafter, stitcher and sewer. The piece above is cross-stitched and its message is simple and yet profound. It now sits close to my desk, so that I can see it when I'm working.

I wonder if, through these extraordinary times of lockdown, there have been times when you have felt like giving up? If you haven't, thank God for your faith and your resilience. If you have felt like giving up, you are definitely not alone, so be kind to yourself.

Even people of faith are not immune from fatigue, sickness, fear, worry, anxiety, depression, Covid-19 or any of the other things than can seem to crowd in on us. PARISH COUNCIL OFFICE CLOSURE

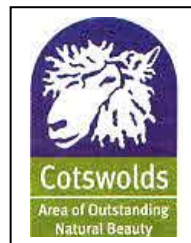

In general, think of any number x say and also add one to it to get x+1, then x+1 and (x+1)/x will always work. Let say x = 100, then x+1=101. The two numbers will be 101/100 and 101. Added or multiplied the result will be 102 1/100. There are as many solutions as numbers!

The Oldest Man in the World

The number of centenarians in the UK has increased from an estimated 107 in 1911 to 13,170 in 2018. There are increasing chances of anyone living to a 100 every year as nutrition and healthcare improve.

Bob Weighton had been confirmed as the oldest man in the world https://gerontology.wikia.org/wiki/Bob_Weighton and we had the pleasure of knowing him when lived in Hampshire.

He was born on March 29th 1908, in Kingston-Upon-Hull, Yorkshire and was one of seven children. He has lived in Taiwan, Canada and the USA before returning to the UK. He then lived in assisted accommodation in Alton, Hampshire. He was a keen environmentalist and Methodist lay preacher.

When we lived in Hampshire, I was supplying him with scrap wood which he used to make a range of items. I took this picture of Bob when he was at a mere 101 with a model windmill in 2009. He made several of these which he sold for charity. They were beautifully engineered. The sails went round and the bearing was made from the outside of a ball point pen.



Whenever you went to visit him, he would always invite you in and have a chat. I hope he survived the current social distancing well and sadly his 112th birthday this year had to be celebrated with social distancing in evidence. He had asked that the Queen should not send him any more birthday cards as he had several already!

Nature Box - A Love Affair

Like most love affairs it happened by chance.



The house we had built came with a number of defects - the builder eventually running off to France to escape his debts. But by a happy accident one flaw provided perfect accommodation under the eaves for swifts, and we were duly adopted. Serendipity.

So for twenty-five years swifts became an integral part of our lives: awaiting their arrival in early May, dragging the summer behind them; listening to their comings and goings; and rescuing a few of the fledglings who became grounded in the garden or trapped in the loft when ready to fly. How lucky were we? So the thought that they might now become but a memory in our summer landscape just feels unthinkable. So, a special thank you to those neighbours who are providing essential nesting sites (*) for these iconic birds who only spend a quarter of their lives with us.

Although adult swifts can currently be enjoyed as they circle the village in their screaming parties, young swifts yet to fledge and hidden away from view, will in some cases have to lose weight as their bodyweight-to-wing ratio is critical; as well as completing wingtip press-ups to be ready for their first flight. When they launch out of the nest they will likely head straight to sub-Saharan Africa - ahead of their parents - unguided and continuously flying for the next two or three years. Nature - you couldn't make it up.

Willersey 40 years Ago

The Rector was Walter Johnson. His Pastoral News quotes a young person's letter where she says "with a possible impending world disaster this earth could be destroyed. If it was, how would I know I have been alive mentally, physically and spiritually? She is desperate to find a meaning to life.

The Wednesday Club was going strong with a visit to Ragley Hall in June.

Richard Ingles was Chairman of the Parish Council. A fox had killed three of the Aylesbury ducks on the pond leaving just one. Replacements were coming once they had hatched. The fine for parking on the village Greens was increased to £50. The rate of building in Jordans Close and Willow Road was limited to 20 dwellings per year. Elm saplings on Willersey Hill, which had escaped the Dutch elm disease would have any scrub cut around them to encourage their growth.

The Mothers' Union, the Mother & Toddler Group and the Women's Institute were all going strongly. Willersey also had Brownies, Snooker Club, Cricket Club and a Slimming Group which had been going for ten months. Church Street had its Stores with a Post Office. Willersey Stores was also in in Main Street.
