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PASTORAL LETTER – SEPTEMBER 2020

In one of my weekly email letters, which I've been writing since the beginning of the lockdown, I shared with my readers some of my favourite verses in the Bible from the Old Testament. The verses are to be found in the First Book of Kings, chapter 19.

In the reading, we learn about a faithful man of God called Elijah. He'd been having a rotten time of it and was in what could only be described as a dark place, emotionally, mentally and spiritually. Elijah remained steadfast in his faith, while many around him abandoned theirs. He'd been zealous for God and yet, no matter what he did, his life was in danger as his enemies sought to kill him. Things had become so bad that he even prayed that he might die. In human terms, things looked pretty hopeless.

However, God's had plans for Elijah and so God sent an angel to him who told him to make his way to Horeb, the mountain of God. He went there desperate, desolate and empty. He went seeking encouragement and reassurance. And this is what happened,

'God said, "Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by." Now there was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave.' (NRSV)

God gave Elijah all that he needed, and more besides, through this personal encounter. What I particularly love and appreciate about this reading is that reminds us that encounter with God may occur in a way, or through a person or situation, that we're least expecting. God being almighty, we might have expected Elijah to cover his face because he discerned the presence of God in the mighty wind, earthquake and fire. But, unexpectedly, perhaps, God was in the 'sheer silence.'

I pray that, in these times of continued uncertainty, we would make time in our lives to have personal encounter with the living God. As we have that encounter – and God is always to be found when we seek Him – may we each discover afresh that it is in God, and in God alone, hope in deepest uncertainty, calm in the fiercest storm and love beyond all telling, is to be found.

Are you into Gin? – a local success story

Cotswold RDA launch their FUN dog show!

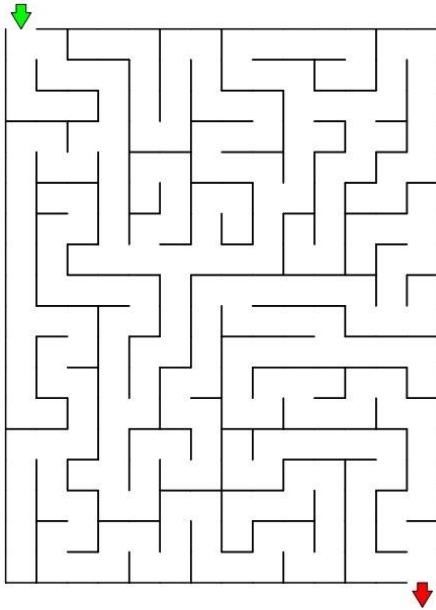

Nature Box Unintended Countryside

At its peak and before Mr Beeching slashed railway lines, there were over 23,000 miles of public rail track in Britain. There are Willersey residents who can vividly recall travelling by train from Willersey Holt station to Cheltenham and beyond.

Although long since an active line, the track bed here remains and has been colonised by nature, creating a lovely green unofficial nature heritage GWR intentions, the land Sustrans - a safe, So it may just cycleway for dog-strollers as well as engines again chug



by nature, creating a corridor - a kind of reserve. Although the railway may have become an upgraded walkers, joggers and cyclists before steam in to Willersey Holt.

The slipstream of trains over the years has famously spread seeds of many plants right across the country, including rosebay willow-herb and most famously the poisonous ragwort. Our accidental Willersey 'greenway' has these and is a thick assortment of trees and undergrowth, where wildlife has moved in over the years and thrives, with foxes, owls and assorted rodents; gatekeeper and speckled wood butterflies, and a myriad of other insects adding to the food chain for resident small birds such as robins, wrens, and tits; and migrant chiffchaffs and blackcaps whose spring song brightens our day. This is a rich habitat whose wildlife also spills over to enrich our gardens. There can be real advantages for nature and for us when perhaps, happenchance, we allow a little untidiness.
