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PASTORAL LETTER December 2020 and January 2021



**‘The light shines in the darkness,
and the darkness did not overcome it.’ (NRSV)**

I love this very simple photo because, contained within it, is a profound message that is directly relevant to the approaching season of Christmas. As you look at the photo, note the amount of darkness. A cursory glance would have you believe that it is darkness that dominates the image. But, when looked at for longer and in a bit more detail, the exact opposite is true. In this image a light shines in the darkness. No matter how much darkness you see, the light transforms and overcomes the darkness. The darkness does not – cannot – overwhelm the light.

The wonderful words at the start of my letter are found in the opening verses of St John’s Gospel. They are words filled with hope and, it seems to me, words that we all need to hear more than ever before. Light overcoming darkness is a theme that permeates every aspect of Christmas. The ‘darkness’ is our sin. Sin of which we are all guilty. Sin that separates us from God. In the darkness of sin, just as in physical darkness, we can feel lost and uncertain of our direction of travel. The darkness can overwhelm us. But, when a light is shone on our darkness everything changes:

We no longer feel lost, we can see once more where we are going, and the fear dissipates as rapidly as the light transforms the darkness.

The 'light' that St John was writing about is Jesus Christ. Elsewhere in St John's Gospel, Jesus said, as he tried to help people understand who he is,

"I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life." (NRSV)

And so we come to the very heart of the message of Christmas – and it is this: By taking on human form, by becoming one of us, Jesus – and Jesus alone – is able to bridge the chasm that exists between humankind and God. Because Jesus Christ came to dwell among us (that is the reason why we celebrate Christmas) all who believe in him and who accept the salvation that he offers are forgiven, the gulf is bridged, and we go from the despair of darkness to eternal hope in Jesus.

2020 will go down for some as a year dominated by the darkness of COVID-19. I pray that the light of Jesus Christ will shine ever more brightly on you and those you love this Christmas and in 2021. Ros and I send our love and prayers for Christmas and always,

The Parish Council have been informed by Newlands that they will be submitting a planning application in December to extend the Willow Green site in Collin Lane down to The Quinary with the addition of up to 40 new houses. The Parish Council have successfully opposed a similar previous application and it was also rejected at appeal.

However Newlands have redesigned the application and are making another attempt.

Wordsearch for December 2020
Silent Night

This much-loved carol comes from Austria, where it was first sung as *Stille Nacht, heilige Nacht* on Christmas Eve, 1818. It was written by Father Joseph Mohr, a young priest at St Nicholas Parish church, in the village of Oberndorf bei Salzburg. As Christmas 1818 approached, he asked the local schoolmaster, Franz Xaver Gruber, to compose a melody for his carol. Gruber was organist in the nearby village of Arnsdorf, and so was happy to oblige. On Christmas Eve they presented the carol to the church during the midnight mass. The carol went on to become loved world-wide; and the version sung by Bing Crosby is the third best-selling single of all time.

Nature Box



*The North Wind doth
 blow
 And we shall have Snow
 And what will noor Robin*



The robin topped a recent poll for the nation's favourite bird, our second most common breeding bird after the wren - that bird that we often don't see! The robin's popularity is attributed to their tameness, recognisable colourful appearance and singing, which unlike most other songbirds even occurs in the depth of winter.

We've had a fondness for the robin down the centuries and they continue to often be included on our Christmas cards. One possible explanation for a robin's appearance on Christmas cards is the link to Victorian England postmen delivering cards when it first became fashionable. Postmen then wore bright red uniforms and became nicknamed 'Robins'. It's been suggested that it was an easy step to swap the postman for a red breasted robin bearing an envelope in its bill to the front of many of our Christmas cards.

Robins will still be singing at this time of year to keep a winter territory - but currently a little more focussed upon getting enough to eat with darkness being twice as long as daylight. However, their excellent eyesight is really helpful in feeding early and late, plus keeping an eye out for winged and four footed predators.

Most robins never see a second winter, so finding a mate and passing on his genes is a priority for males. Even robins find identifying each other's sex at first sight a challenge; so the initial behaviour of a male is usually aggressive while he works out whether this is a competitor or a potential mate to woo.

Willersey Nature Box Extra - a snapshot



What follows is a record of the birds seen in and close to the village: a snapshot recorded over the past three years between 2018-2020. Thank you to well over 40 contributors from across the village via emails, phone calls and casual conversations that have helped capture this picture. Low level citizen science in action. Whilst we are right to be concerned about once familiar losses to the immediate area of such birds as the cuckoo and turtle dove, there is good news too, with a rich mix of Willersey bird sightings reported, and in increasing numbers in some cases to help balance the losses. Rough accidental habitat on the village edge is helping support numbers; but the vital role of gardens providing good habitat and bird food is a significant factor too.

Garden and farmland birds

Robin, blackbird, house sparrow, dunnock, wren, blue tit, great tit, long tailed tit, coal tit, marsh tit, goldfinch, chaffinch, greenfinch, bull finch, goldcrest, tree creeper, nuthatch, song thrush, mistle thrush, starling, wood pigeon, collared dove, stock dove, feral pigeon, carrion crow, rook, jackdaw, raven, magpie, jay, green woodpecker, greater spotted woodpecker, pied wagtail, linnets, siskin, skylark, yellow hammer, mallard, mandarin duck, Canada goose, lapwing, heron, lesser and greater black backed gull, herring gull, pheasant, partridge grey wagtail, kingfisher, woodcock, cormorant and ring-necked parakeet.

Raptors

Kestrel, buzzard, sparrowhawk, red kite, peregrine falcon, tawny owl, barn owl and little owl.

Migrant birds

Swallow, swift, house martin - all nesting in the village - blackcap, chiffchaff, white throat, wheatear, redwing and fieldfare.

There will have been other unrecorded birds, but all of the above have been reliably reported. An impressive total of 69 species.
