Climbing Everest

At the end of July I will need to develop a new morning routine. For the past 11 or so years my daily routine in the week has been to walk the children to primary school. When our first daughter started school she was too ill to walk to school. As she gathered strength I determined to walk with her, and her siblings, whenever I could. I have been fortunate to have an occupation that has allowed me to adjust my working day in this way. I am very conscious of others who have not had this privilege.

The morning routine has worked well: it has given the girls some fresh air and exercise before school, it allows the dog a short walk and my return to the Vicarage provides a clear start to my working day. I have not always been able to adjust my afternoons to fit in the school run but more often than not I have collected them from school too. This has given us many hours of conversation. I have heard about their school days and friendships, as well as practiced times tables and spellings, and sometimes, of course, we just walked in silence.

We lived a mile from the first school they attended, only half a mile in Campden. A conservative estimate of these combined journeys, even allowing for home-schooling during covid, is over 4000 thousand miles compared with walking up and down Everest eight times. Of course, as it is with most mundane things, I can't remember very many individual journeys or conversations but as I

look back over the last decade I am pleased that I prioritised making this task part of my week day routine.

As life gets more busy; as our diaries begin to fill, we need more than ever to carve out and protect the things that bring us joy and give us and those around us life. As we create space to be renewed we are reminded of God's love for us and his delight in us. Culturally we often, mistakenly, equate busyness with value or significance. We can falsely subscribe to the thought that important people are busy so therefore people who aren't busy aren't important. This leads to the damaging belief that a full diary; a busy life is inherently good. This isn't a Christian view – God's loves us all equally and that love isn't dependent upon what we do or achieve.

As a member of the clergy I am not immune to this cultural pressure. As we come out of lock-down I need to remind myself of this truth – God loves me for who I am, not what I do. I too feel the cultural pressure to be busy. I too hear the voices that whisper busyness is good, and right and proper. Rejection of this lie is not a charter for idleness or sloth but an invitation to prioritise that which is good and life giving. As people who know Jesus we can orientate our lives in a way that brings life. This is a prophetic challenge, for in doing this we show others they too need not be slaves to busyness, rush and hurry.

We all have opportunities to incorporate things that bring joy and life to us and others into our daily routines. We can all be intentional but so often we let time and opportunities pass without really thinking at all. We are in control of our dairies – they should not control us!

This month may you make time for the things that bring you and others life.

Guided Walks led by Cotswold Voluntary Wardens

The guided walks programme has restarted and the Cotswold Wardens are once again leading the public on walks in a safe and careful way.

Walkers must reserve their place through the booking system as numbers are capped to keep the walks manageable. Walks are available to book up to 14 days before.

Treebilee

In 1935 the village planted the Jubilee Tree to commemorate the Silver Jubilee of King George V and the tree has since become a centre point of the village.

In March this year the Prince of Wales launched the Queens Green Canopy, a nationwide planting scheme designed to create a lasting legacy to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee or, as the Prince of Wales described it, a "Tree-bilee".

On behalf of the village the Parish Council would like to participate in this scheme and is considering a suggestion to plant a row of mixed native trees in the Recreation ground which the Parish Council owns and manages.

The proposal is to plant 20 substantial saplings of 8-10 cm diameter alongside the willows on the western side of the ground. To make space and to tidy up the area. Some willows, including the damaged or diseased, would be removed.

This would result in a substantial financial saving since these willows currently need pollarding every three years at a cost of some £3000. If not pollarded, then the weight of the branches causes them to split the trunk resulting in the current damaged trees. This saving would more than cover the cost of planting the new saplings.

There is a planning application to change the use of the village shop from retail to residential.



Recent Sightings

Here in Willersey, back on dry land, drum roll please: the swifts are back and occupying previous village nest sites. 'They've made it again, which means the globe's still working.' (Ted Hughes)

Other reported village wildlife sightings from Glennys, Rachael, Trevor, Jenny & Rex, Gi, Brenda, Derek, Marlene, David, Louise, Pete B, Heather, Robert, Kathy, Mike & Shirley, Sandra, Beccie, Sandy and Pete K include house martins (but possibly not nesting!), a bullfinch, whitethroats, cuckoo (hooray), hunting sparrowhawks and kites, nesting great-spotted woodpeckers and kestrels, jays, a rare sighting of a wild bronze turkey, along with reports of bold jackdaws monopolising some folk's feeders. Bumble bees occupying a bird box, a beautiful banded demoiselle; and perhaps most unusual a pair of squabbling moles spotted in broad daylight; a water vole in one of our spring fed village streams; and although slightly off our patch an otter caught raiding fish from a Childswickham garden pond.

There have also been tales of nesting successes for blue and great tits, robins and blackbirds along with the usual dramas such as great tit chicks being ejected from their home by nest box stealing starlings; and a woodpecker drilling into a blue tit nest box with a narrow escape for the occupants it seems. Phew!

A 'SHORT' HISTORY OF THE VILLAGE HALL – AS I REMEMBER IT!

First of all, whoever put the photo in the mag of the 'first'? Carnival I can remember in the village, 'thank you'. But then I only came in 1963! The Village Hall then was an old Nissan hut; Welfare, WI, snooker, all took place there but there would have been other gatherings that, as a newcomer, I wouldn't have known. The village hall was getting to the end of its life and how were we going to replace it? In the end of spring, 1965, bossy newcomer, Penny Ingles, went to see Mrs Arkwright at her home, Willersey House. I can't remember why it was me. A group of us got together, Jane Lampit was certainly one of the others. She knew everyone so she stood by me – we were a force to be reckoned with! Mrs Arkwright was very kind when we told her we were trying to raise money for the hall and agreed to open the event. It was to be a carnival starting on the top green (outside Hill Farm) with a judging of the Fancy Dress and procession down the village to the rec where prizes would be given out and various 'attractions' would be happening, including tea. I remember buying a dark green plate from Mrs Frampton, Pat Hemming's grandmother, sold on the jumble sale stall. I think we raised around £200 - which in those days was very good. We held a Christmas Fair in the old hall, I think that following Christmas. We raised more money with raffle tickets (printed by the Lowe's of Broadway – for free), and I had to add to the list of prizes saying 'and many more' prizes; which caused trouble because in the end there was only one more prize! I got told off by Mrs Bird and Mrs Smith (Dinner Lady). Mr Kilby gave us a big box of apples for it and others were very generous and more money was raised. I can see a few more people in the photo – 1) The child on the truck was Jane Ingles (not Janet) she was elected by the First Class (Miss Beak's) from the School. David, her Dad was her 'horse'. Clarice Ingles organised and herded the fancy dressed children, her daughter, Hilary, has her back to the camera and holds a lamb. You can't see him but one of the youngest entries was Simon Lampitt (son of Jane & John; and they lived at that time with Jane's parents at Sycamore House). Simon is just months older than our Chris. He went as 'Bill the Milkman'; had a tiny truck with 2 bottles in it, wore a cap and had a sweet cigarette in his mouth. Bill Hall was the milkman for years and kept his float in the front barn.

The new village hall was built and finished in 1967, when Uncle Bert 'opened' the hall - and I was in bed having just had Peter. You had to stay in bed in those days!

Herring gulls - the gull that is the soundtrack to Desert Island Discs; along with the really sizeable great black-backed gull and their slightly smaller cousin the lesser black-backed gull, both with pronounced black wing colouration. But remember, the herring gull is the one to watch out for at the coast if you want to protect your chips or ice-cream cone.

But a common favourite for many is the oyster catcher - that black and white bird with the long pointed red beak and matching legs, often noisily patrolling the shoreline. Redshanks are special too, the wader that has a reputation for being the bird that is the chief noisy lookout, warning other species of possible danger. Turnstones are another to seek out in rocky locations as it does what it says on the tin: busily and deftly turning over stones seeking juicy morsels.

And then there are cormorants and shags, which when they're not inland and upsetting trout farmers with their skilled fishing talents, are often to be seen decorating the rocks and harbour vantage points as they hold out their sizeable black wings to dry. Let's hope some of us get a chance to see some of these coastal delights.
