PASTORAL LETTER – APRIL 2023 Full Stops and Clean Pages

At the end of year service for the leavers at Mickleton Primary School one of the staff read the poem, Full stop by Mark Bird. It begins,

Last six hours of primary school Goodbye is getting near The sums and sentences all done The full stop day is here.

The poem continues counting down the hours until the last ever second of primary school,
Last ever second of primary school
The full stop rings in our ears
But a thousand chapters left to write ...

The juxtaposition between the end and the beginning is beautifully expressed and succinctly captured what so many of the young people were feeling that day. Of course it's not just children moving between school years or schools that experience this simultaneous finishing and beginning. At certain times in our lives the movement between chapters can be painfully or deliciously obvious.

In a less noticeable way a fresh new page is offered to us each day. A clean white page in which if we choose, we can begin again and yet often the troubles, trials and tribulations of the past sometimes mark the new page we are offered.

St Paul writing to the church in Philippi (chapter 3 verses 7 to 16) talks about 'forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead. I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call to God in Christ Jesus'

(v13/14). Paul invites us to let go of the things that impede us and know the freedom and wholeness of a life with Jesus.

At the start of the new academic year, and as the parish enters a period of vacancy following Revd Scott's move back to Cambridge, it's a good thing for us to reflect on. What things do we carry that we could let go of? Are the shoulds, oughts and musts that rule our lives all necessary? Too often we carry the values and expectations of others. These values and expectations do not make us happy, they do not allow us or others to flourish – where have they come from? Jesus offers us, life in all its fullness (John 10:10). We are offered a clean page, a new chapter, a fresh start, a new beginning. What would you like to record on today's clean page? What could you do today that allows you to flourish? May this month be full of joyful opportunities and

Recent Village Sightings

One swallow certainly doesn't make a summer but many of us, especially those who have been lucky enough to have them nesting close by, will be looking out for their imminent arrival. In the meantime there have been some interesting local sightings. Although many songbirds move about in mixed parties during winter months there have been reports of larger numbers of chaffinches and even a sizeable flock of a dozen greenfinches. A pair of song thrushes seen tussling over a juice worm. Raptors have been much in evidence with a garden visiting sparrowhawk, numerous sightings of kites, a little owl, and several people have reported views of a barn owl on the village edge, with returning redwing also in the mix. Also a more unusual sighting of a little egret seen along and Badsey Lane, that rather comical looking bird with black legs and bright yellow feet.

But perhaps most newsworthy has been the sighting of an otter in a village garden. This is not the first report of an otter in Willersey in recent years but does underline their willingness to travel long distances from major watercourses.

APRIL'S BIRD SONG - Chiffchaff Although the chiffchaff is not a regular garden visitor its persistent call from trees close to the village is a true herald of spring, unmistakeably calling its name with "chiffchaff, chiffchaff", and occasionally throwing in a "chaffchiff" to try and confuse us! A sound we really should celebrate given the thousands of miles the chiffchaff - which weighs no more than a 50 pence piece - has travelled from sub Saharan Africa to join us for the summer.

HONEYBOURNE CROSSROADS SURVEY 5 MINUTES TO HELP IMPROVE ROAD SAFETY

At a Weston Sub Edge village meeting in early 2023 concerns were expressed about safety at the B4035 Honeybourne Crossroads. Data is only collected by the authorities on Blue Light incidents where an ambulance, fire engine and or the police were called. This survey is an attempt to add to that data with further information on Blue Light and non Blue Light incidents to help action to be taken. We are interested in both actual accidents i.e. collisions AND near misses. Your answers will be held in confidence and only shared as a summary unless you choose to be involved in any further investigation on an individual basis. Even if you haven't had any direct involvement in an accident, or a near miss, you can still contribute your improvement ideas at the end of the survey. There has been ongoing dialogue with Gloucestershire Highways but the accident rate does not seem to improve - please help us provide the data to encourage GH to act.



SPIRING WOMEN Speaker Bonnie Garvey March 13th 'Changing the Lives of Women and Children in South Africa'

On a wet and cold evening in March Bonnie Garvey joined us to share her experiences of travelling in South Africa. She'd been moved by the poverty and social injustices within the country and highlighted to us the difficulties faced there and her involvement in helping to raise awareness in support of a programme now in place.

There is lack of education for the under-fives in South Africa, mistreatment of women and children at home and in the work place, lack of health care and the ever-present threat of HIV. This in addition to corruption at every level makes it incredibly challenging.

An organisation called 'Singakwenza' (a lovely word meaning 'we can do it' - a mantra we could all follow), is a small group of South African women who have been trained as nursery school educators. These in turn have trained others and they run schools for the under-fives. This gives them an education and opportunity to play in a safe environment. The children use recycled materials to make toys and adults are taught book keeping skills. The school now supports 300 children who for £1 a month can receive education and food.

Bonnie is in the process or writing a report about the work and we can only hope that more people get involved and are inspired by Bonnie's message.

Nature Box 'My Toe Hurts, Betty'

People down the ages have often linked a bird's call to a particular memorable phrase. 'My toe hurts, Betty' is the wood pigeon for me, and once you too have put these words to the wood pigeon's call it will probably become an 'ear worm' for you and you'll hear it more and more over the coming weeks. Sorry!

As a child I can remember that meals were eaten at the small kitchen table with fold down sides. But Sunday lunch was always different, with the whole family sat down together at the big table in the sitting room. Our third floor flat gave a grandstand view of the opposite roofline, if you managed to bag the right chair. The roof top pigeons seemed to spend an inordinate amount of time with the males cosying up, bowing and spreading tail feathers to apparently disinterested females who then shifted further down the roof top before the whole process was repeated before she, having lost patience, flew off. But just occasionally there would be the briefest of couplings before both parties drifted apart seemingly with total disinterest. It was a good watch for a youngster as he tucked into his apple pie and custard or on special occasions ice cream and tinned fruit.

In Willersey it is of course wood pigeons that predominate with their ungainly waddling like an over importantly looking maitre d' at a posh restaurant before noisily flapping as they take off. They are not everyone's favourite but do enjoy subtle grey colouring with the white patch on their neck and wing bars displayed as they fly away. With their ability to have as many as three or more broods a year through the benefit of pigeon's milk made from a mix of regurgitated plants and insects it is not surprising that their numbers nationally are on the increase. Dambusters Raid 80th Anniversary Lancaster Commemorative Events

On **Tuesday 16th May**, Willersey will remember the Dambusters' audacious and heroic raid in 1943 on the great dams of Germany's industrial area in the Ruhr. Eight out of 617 Squadron's nineteen Lancaster bombers were lost that night, at a cost of 53 lives.

At 4pm, on that day, we will remember this sacrifice and the loss of the squadron's Second in Command, Willersey's Sqn Ldr Henry Maudslay, with a special, brief service of Evening Prayer in Saint Peter's Church and the laying of a wreath at our War Memorial.

Thereafter, at 7pm, there will be a special, social event in the Village Hall to remember all three, young, Willersey men who gave their lives, as Lancaster bomber crew. This will include tributes to Anthony Kyall, Henry Maudslay and Edgar Proctor, commentary from former RAF aircrew, film of the Lancaster at War and other features in what promises to be a fascinating, and memorable occasion.


