PASTORAL LETTER – MAY 2023

Welcoming A New Order

The Coronation of King Charles gives us and the nation the opportunity to pause and think what type of nation are we and what type of nation do we want to be. The pageantry, laden with symbolism, draws on a rich history and invites us to ask want relevance does this ceremony have for today and the rest of the King's reign. It is inevitable that at such a time we will learn new things about our nation and about ourselves.

In the religious elements of the coronation and festivities we are reminded that King Charles is, as were all the Kings and Queens before him, a servant of the one true eternal King. We pray for him, the leaders of our nation, our parliament and for the leaders of the world that they would rule without fear or favour for the common good and work for peace and justice.

As King Charles subjects, as Christ's followers we are invited to live lives marked by service of one another and creation. On the Monday 8th following the coronation many communities are planning events as part of "*The Big Help Out*" – an initiative to encourage people to volunteer and join work being undertaken to support and improve their local areas. Some communities will be undertaking environmental projects this will doubtless include tree planting which will add to the over 1 million trees planted for the Platinum Jubilee of Her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in 2020. How does how we live point to the future we desire. What world do we want and what are we doing about it in the here and now?

Wild Isles the latest David Attenborough documentary on BBC shown earlier this spring was full of alarming statistics that demonstrated the careless neglect of our nature rich homelands over many decades. As a society we have not prioritised nature of the protection of the natural world.

In the last 50 years, 38 million birds have vanished from UK skies, 97% of our wildflower meadows have been lost since the 1930s, a quarter of all our mammals are at risk of extinction and only 14% of UK rivers in England are in good ecological health. In all Britain has lost more biodiversity than any other G7 nation, and is in the bottom 10% of all countries worldwide. Can we change this? Are we waking up to the damage, degradation and pollution our mindless consumption is causing not just in the British Isles but to the global environment?

Just before Easter I took a short boat ride to Skomer, an island off the Pembrokeshire coast. It is home to the largest puffin colony in the south of our country and the largest nesting site in the world of the illusive nocturnal Manx shearwaters. Seabirds on this rocky outcrop are thriving because of the determined and co-ordinated efforts of the Wildlife Trust of South and West Wales who manage it and who use the money raised from visitors solely for conservation and research. This is a rare success story but it illustrates that when we want to we can do amazing things. We can when we want to. We can when we prioritise, when we forego personal gratification and profit for longer term goals. What world are we creating? What world do we want to create? What are we prepared to do about it? This is a good time to ask ourselves how could we volunteer and support our communities and/or church.

However, vigorously and joyfully we participate in and celebrate in King Charles' coronation we recognise that these things will pass away. In time another Monarch will be crowned. We look forward to that time when Jesus our heavenly King will begin his eternal reign of peace, justice and joy.

This month may we work for a better world, may we notice and appreciate the wonders of our Wild Isles home, may we celebrate the Heavenly King in our daily lives, Every blessing Revd Craig

Dambusters Raid 80th Anniversary

Lancaster Commemorative Events

On **Tuesday 16th May**, Willersey will remember the Dambusters' audacious and heroic raid in 1943 on the great dams of Germany's industrial area in the Ruhr. Eight out of 617 Squadron's nineteen Lancaster bombers were lost that night, at a cost of 53 lives.

At 4pm, on that day, we will remember this sacrifice and the loss of the squadron's Second in Command, Willersey's Sqn Ldr Henry Maudslay, with a special, brief service of Evening Prayer in Saint Peter's Church and the laying of a wreath at our War Memorial.

Thereafter, at 7pm, there will be a special, social event in the Village Hall to remember all three, young, Willersey men who gave their lives, as Lancaster bomber crew. This will include tributes to Anthony Kyall, Henry Maudslay and Edgar Proctor, commentary from former RAF aircrew, film of the Lancaster at War and other features in what promises to be a fascinating, and memorable occasion.

Admission is free with donations being received, gratefully, towards the restoration of the Saintbury War Memorial which was destroyed by Hurricane Eunice, last year. Please see the advertisement in this issue for information on booking free tickets for the event.

They're on their way! More about returning Willersey swifts later on after some news of migrants that have already reached us.

But first thank you to Sue, Adine, Sandy, Pete, Laura, Robert & Helen, Sarah, Tom, Derek, Tini, Mal, Sandy, Flick, Pete B, Gillian & Trevor, Tony and Mike & Shirley for sharing their news.

Several reports of arriving chiffchaffs, with the disused railway track being one hot spot; and a few returning swallows too.

At the time of writing in mid April there have been a number of sightings of birds collecting nesting materials including kites and chimney nesting jackdaws. Blackbirds and robins have already produced their first young of the year; with blue tits, great tits and house sparrows using village nest boxes and soon to be busily feeding their newly hatched young before they fledge later in May.

Other spring wildlife reports have seen wriggling tadpoles recorded, those strikingly yellow brimstone butterflies on the wing, and even an amazingly perhaps misguided hummingbird hawkmoth, that usually migrate in summer months from mainland Europe, but putting in an early appearance one bright, sunny day.

But what about those swifts that are indeed speedy, with the fastest recorded flight from south west Africa, a common stop over for birds migrating to UK villages like Willersey, covering the 3200 miles in just FIVE DAYS. However, average migration time is much slower - perhaps nearer to 200 miles a day, but still pretty impressive. So keep an eye out and savour their arrival this month as they'll only be here for just 11/12 weeks.

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Nature Box Silent Assassin

I'm trying to make myself invisible. Quietly waiting for something, but knowing that even if I am to be lucky it probably won't happen until the last rays of daylight have slipped away.

Then the barn owl appeared, shuffling somewhat ungainly from its daytime resting place. My luck was in and it hadn't detected my presence. After some brief preening it even chose to fly and perch just a few feet above my head, and then before defecating perilously close to me, flying on to another seemingly favourite perch, travelling in total silence on soft feathered wings. Did s/he still have a mate? Would there be successfully fledged young like last year? Truly magical - and all of this just a few minutes walk from our village, with barn owls witnessed over recent weeks by a number of Willersey residents.

Barn owls are brilliantly effective hunters of mice and voles, so that outside of the breeding season, when additional food is required, they may only need to hunt for a couple of hours a night, roosting for the remaining 22 hours. They will often choose to hunt into the wind as it aids their slow meticulous search for prey. Although perfectly designed for their way of hunting their feathers are not waterproof so they cannot hunt in the rain, and very windy weather hinders their acute hearing essential for seeking out their unsuspecting prey; and at such times of harsh weather they can occasionally be seen in daylight. Once a pair have found an area that suits they will almost certainly remain for all of their lives.

If you are really fortunate whilst making your way home one night down Willersey's darkened streets, perhaps from one of our hostelries, you may be lucky enough to be surprised be the spine chilling screech of a barn owl. Once heard never to be forgotten. Bob Topp

The April meeting was Julie's project on vintage seed packets. Most members had made a start on their design. Forget-me-not proved a popular choice.

Discussion as to what the designs would be developed into were varied. Some thought a cover for a notebook, a pattern on a bag or a design on a memory box.
