PASTORAL LETTER – JUNE 2023

Gardens

We are again opening the garden as part of the Campden Open Gardens weekend (17^{th} and 18^{th} June) as a curiosity rather than as a exemplar of good practice. My paternal great-grand father was a gardener on an estate in the south Cotswolds. Both my grandfather and father kept immaculate lawns; a great frustration to the seven grandsons, three sons who saw their lawns as perfect football pitches or cricket wickets. Mowers were cylinder not rotary. No moss or other weeds were tolerated. How different we are – the weeds in the lawn are celebrated.

For the past four of so years we have embraced not just "No Mow May" but "No mow summers". As a result, we have been rewarded by an ever increasing number of wild flowers, including some orchids.

I am no gardener but I enjoy gardens, most especially other people's gardens. In my own garden I too readily see chores and tasks that need doing. I am grateful for my family and friends who unencumbered by that critical eye enjoy it. Slowly, and I'm still work in progress, I am getting better at appreciating its beauty and loveliness. In some part I think this is because after being here a few years I am aware of the changes, the fruits of my labours: plants and borders that I have planted and nurtured.

I am mindful not to do too much as I won't want the garden to become a millstone for the next occupants of the Vicarage. The garden in our former home was spectacular as the previous vicar's spouse had dedicated themselves to creating a truly beautiful garden. They knew what they were doing and had chosen plants and shrubs that complemented each other wonderfully. There was interest throughout the year and specific beds for specific seasons. When people hear where we lived, people would comment on the garden. **1** I felt a tremendous pressure to keep on top of the garden or at least not allow it to decline too much. I was always several weeks behind where I should have been. I really only enjoyed it vicariously through the pleasure of others.

St Teresa of Avila was one of many saints who drew closer to God in gardens. She likened the soul of one who desires to love and serve God as a garden—God plants good seed in all of us, and it is up to us to diligently tend and water these plants in the garden of our soul.

Throughout the year gardens, the agricultural landscape and the natural world bring us a cycle of pleasures and delights. Don't be too busy or too distracted to savour the splendours of the delightful month of June.

Enjoy the summer breeze, the warmth of the sun and the beauty of the world.

Tend and water the plants in your care that they might flourish and bloom.

80th Anniversary of the Dambusters Raid Lancaster Commemorative Events

On Tuesday, 16 May, Anniversary of the famous Dambusters Raid, Willersey remembered the 53 men who lost their lives in the eight Lancasters that were shot down that historic night, including Squadron Leader Henry Maudslay. We also remembered Anthony Kayll and Edgar Proctor from Willersey who both gave their lives whilst serving in Lancasters during the War.

In the afternoon, a special service of Evening Prayer in Saint Peter's Church was followed, at the War Memorial, by an Act of Remembrance for 617 Squadron's Fallen including Henry and for Anthony and Edgar. Squadron Leader Robin Woolven laid a wreath on behalf of the Parish and the Dambusters Association. Members of Edgar's and Henry's families attended the events, including Eddie's daughter and niece and two of Henry's nieces, one of whom, Angela Gardiner, placed the Remembrance cross for Henry during the Act of Remembrance. Crosses were also laid for Anthony and Edgar.

In the evening, villagers packed the Village Hall for a social and commemorative evening. This included tributes to all three of our Lancaster Fallen. Sqn Leader Woolven shared recollections of RAF Scampton, the Dambusters' base for the Raid, during his time there whilst flying with 617 Sqn in Vulcans. Jennie Bond read "High Flight", a poem written by a 19-year-old fighter pilot who lost his life in 1941 and later read the amazing and moving letter Henry had written to be sent to his mother in the event of his death. An interview with Air Commodore Mike Barnes and Flight Lieutenant Clare Byrd gave a lively and fascinating comparison of what it was like to serve and fly in the RAF during WWII compared with their more recent service.

The evening included clips of the Dambusters taking off for their mission and Wing Commander Guy Gibson reflecting on the raid. It ended with the video of the Lancaster Bomber Over Willersey, which is now available to view on YouTube by searching for "Lancaster Dambuster Flypast 2022 over Cotswold Village of Willersey". The three, full tributes to Anthony Kayll, Henry Maudslay and Edgar Proctor can be found on the Willersey Website at <u>www.willersey.org</u> under "History" then "Life Stories & Obituaries".

Henry Maudslay's niece, Victoria Trevelyan, who was born in Willersey at Foxhill Manor, proposed a vote of thanks for the events and Rob Heming echoed this. Donations given during the events were for the fund to restore the Saintbury War Memorial, the column of which was destroyed by the storm in February 2022. Any additional donations can be made by cheque payable to "PCC of Willersey" delivered to Judith McNeil-Wilson. PCC Treasurer, the Granary, Main Street.

Lesson over and back to our June service which was taken by Mark with Rev Craig taking the Christening part . There were two, Nora and Oscar. Oscar was quite laid back with the water on his head but Nora was not too keen.

During the service we processed outside of the church to bless the fields and cattle/sheep. Gillian read the lesson here and a hymn was sung. Next we moved around the east end of the Church to bless Willersey and Saintbury churches after which we sang "The Lord is my Shepherd". Robert read psalm 121 here and then we moved to the West side where Bel read our lesson and Ken said a prayer. Here we sang "All things bright and beautiful". Thinking of the flowers and all the plants we grow on our gardens. When we returned to church Rev Craig took the rest of the baptismal service with the congregation joining in. Prayers were said by Jennie and Rob McNeil Wilson. Pat then gave out packets of seeds to plant and remember this Service.

The Service ended with the peace and blessing and then it was time for coffee and cakes. Thank you to all who took part including Bel and Bill for welcoming and giving out service sheets. Our next All Age service is on Sunday June 18th at 11:00 o'clock when we will be celebrating Father's Day.

Our celebrations for the Patronal Festival will be on the weekend of the 25th of June. The Church will be decorated and tea served on Saturday the 24th of June and at the service on the 26th of June at 10:00 o'clock.



Swifts, they're back, and they really are birds without borders: constantly inhabiting the air apart from mature breeding birds using remembered nest sites for a few brief weeks each year. It is amazing to think that returning birds will have passed many perhaps more favourable sites but they are 'hard wired' to be Willersey swifts.

After a seemingly slow start returning swallows are now once again nesting in the village, although some swallows have not survived migration and at least three known previously used sites have no swallows this year. Migration to and from South Africa is hazardous so again thank you to those who maintain a suitable nesting site here once they make it back.

There have been lots of reports of other birds and nesting activities, with kestrels, kites, blackbirds, robins, dunnocks and wrens all observed in recent weeks. Nest box breeding success too for blue tits and great tits, although not all of the chicks will survive to fledge successfully. Sightings of great spotted woodpeckers who seem to be doing well locally, and green finches that could do with a good breeding season. An honourable special mention to Sarah for 'rescuing' a female mallard from her garden along with her 9 baby ducklings and safely transferring them to the village pond.

This is of course is prime time for hedgehogs' snuffling courtship, so good to hear that they are now active across the village. Bats are being seen on the wing too, and orange tip, brimstone and comma butterflies all reported recently. 8




Willersey Scarecrow Trail 2023 June 17th - 28th

Nature Box -**OUR GREEN AND PLEASANT LAND**

We British probably love our countryside and wildlife more than any other nation, yet we live in one of the most de-natured landscapes on Earth. Although these regular jottings normally look to celebrate Willersey's wildlife it cannot be ignored that here and right across the country much of our wildlife is in freefall - insects, bird species, hedgehogs, it's a long list.

On many farms recent more intensive farming practices have left little or no room for nature and are part of the problem; with the ongoing pollution of our rivers and coastline another major contributor to the destruction of our flora and fauna. Yes we do need to feed our growing population and provide proper housing for all, but returning to a more balanced approach in how we use our finite countryside is now being recognised by many. Yes, it's complicated, but we need nature for a whole host of reasons from pollinating crops, maintaining wildlife diversity and for our own mental wellbeing. Once it's gone it's gone.

Whilst we can press for change through pressure groups and possibly at the ballot box, many of us can really make a practical difference right now in how we make our gardens and local public spaces more appropriate for our wildlife: whether that be plants for butterflies and bees, suitable habitat for birds and hedgehogs or other native creatures.

The BBC Wild Isles programme brilliantly showcases much that is special about our varied landscapes and wildlife; with David Attenborough's quiet, almost understated call to arms for us to help where we can ringing in our ears. He'd be first on my fantasy dinner party list. National treasure. 13

Willersey WI June 2023 Flower Farming with Jayne Caithness

On Monday May 8th the WI welcomed local flower farmer Jayne Caithness for a lively and compelling talk on her cutting patch and an engaging demonstration of her flower arranging.

Jayne began her working life as a drama teacher. But in 2015, after a long career and a burgeoning desire to do something different, she took early retirement and opened a small business as a flower farmer. Central to this decision was the discovery of an organisation called 'Flowers from the Farm'. A membership association that pulls together U.K seasonal flower farmers, giving them a voice, supporting them and facilitating relationships. This means that small U.K flower farms can have powerful representation and strength that would otherwise be out of their reach. The benefits of this are far reaching. In addition to structured support that can be so vital for a small business locally grown, seasonal flowers that work with the land are significantly more sustainable than Imported flowers that are force grown and mass produced.

Sustainability sits at the heart of Jayne's work. She has shrewdly utilised her garden to create a cutting patch to grow her flowers, always working with nature and respecting the environment. No floral foam, no plastic, no pesticides and no imported flowers. Keeping it natural is Jayne's mantra.

Jayne's drive, enthusiasm and ethos really are infectious and inspiring, but her flower farming journey hasn't always been an easy one. For a while she closed the business when life, as it so often does, presented her with some challenges. But the joy

of flowers was irresistible to Jayne and luckily for us her business 'Vale Garden Flowers' is now in full flow and flourishing again.

Jayne ended her talk with a demonstration (whilst also answering questions). She arranged a table centre piece and a wedding bouquet. I found it mesmerising. Her style echoes the way in which flowers *actually* sit in nature, with movement, flow and balance. As she pulled each bloom and piece of foliage together it was quite magical as each piece gently complimented the next.

Jayne's talk and demonstration were a delight, incredibly informative and thoroughly enjoyed by all of us. Thank you Jayne.
