PASTORAL LETTER – September 2025

Beds, Blubs and Blooms

The garden is ever changing – it never stays still. There are always new things to enjoy. We have a tree in the garden (a katsura?) that drops its leaves early, too early before we are ready. It is a harbinger of the change of seasons.

There is a time in September when the scent of the garden changes – a new smell reminds me of our inextricable orbit of the sun. The seasons change, they come and they go.

Warren Buffet the entrepreneur and philanthropist speaking to class of students asked them pick out one person they admired the most. He then encouraged them to write down why they were admired – a list of qualities. One could do the same with someone you don't admire and put down their qualities. Look at those qualities. The qualities of the first list with a bit of practice you could make your own and which if practiced regularly can become habit forming. Look at the qualities on the second list and avoid them. We have agency over our choices and behaviours.

Brain plasticity is the ability of our brains to adapt its structure and function to learning, experience and injury. Psychologists tell us that if we say something often enough our brains rewire for it. Our thoughts shape our feelings. Our feelings drive our actions, and our actions shape our identity and character. If we can change our thoughts, then we can change who we are and how we behave. This is why prayer is so important – making time in our daily lives to open ourselves to the Holy Spirit, reflecting on the nature and character of Jesus not only connects us to God but it can literally rewire us so we become the person we want to be.

Saint Ignatius developed his spirituality when he was in hospital recovering from injuries. He found meditating on the life of Christ, placing himself mentally within the gospel story filled him with joy and peace. He became more aware of God's love and mercy. Spending time contemplating the love of **1**

God transformed him and led him to devote his life to Jesus.

He also practiced the spiritual discipline, 'The Examine' a way of prayerfully reflecting on the events of the day so we become more aware of God's presence. Review the day with gratitude noting its joys and delights. Focusing on the day's gifts. Looking at what we did, the people we interacted with. Inviting the Holy Spirit to direct us to something during the day that God thinks is particularly important. It may involve a feeling—positive or negative. It may be a significant encounter with another person or a vivid moment of pleasure or peace. Holding that moment in prayer may lead us to intercession, praise, repentance, or gratitude. When such moments happen in the future we will be better equipped to notice them and respond in a godly way.

Jesus came that we might live life in all its fullness – that we might know love, peace, joy and hope.

Change is all around us, it is inevitable. I'm digging up a small bed opposite our kitchen window - its overgrown. I intend to fill it with bulbs and plants which will bring colour and form throughout the seasons – bringing us joy as we do the washing up. I don't have the time (or energy or finance) to do that to every bed, but I can make a difference to this one. The Vicarage Garden is never going to rival Hidcote or Kiftsgate but I can make improvements, I can do a new thing.

Come Holy Spirit - water that which is dry - heal that which is wounded - cleanse that which is unclean. Grant us eternal joy. Amen

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Paths Around Willersey Scheme September 2025

We still hope to go ahead with the Path clearance session scheduled for 10am to 1pm on Saturday 6 th September 2025. We could do with a couple more

volunteers; if you can spare three hours of your time and want to take part, please send an email to register your interest to: willerseypaws@gmail.com. The work will not be too taxing, and you have the chance to give a little back to your Village. You are needed!

We have had a baking hot summer and the rain that has fallen has been mainly overnight. This has been excellent for sun worshipers and also for weeds! Many of the footpaths that were cleared of overgrowing turf are now suffering from weed growth.

Weeds have pushed up through the path's surface and unfortunately will loosen and damage the integrity of the path. The Parish Council has kindly offered to spray the offending weeds with weed-killer.

The PAWS group is looking at ways of maintaining the paths and are hoping to purchase a second-hand petrol strimmer, which the group can use to assist with minor maintenance. Some of the maintenance falls under Gloucestershire County Highways responsibility. They have a rolling rota for such maintenance and unfortunately resources are stretched.

The PAWS group has been in contact with Gloucestershire County Highways on several occasions and have been assured that the drain on the footpath of the B4632 (which runs from the Willersey Village Sign to the County Boundary, will be fully cleared by pressure jetting. It could however take a couple of months before it can be done. In the meantime the PAWS group has cleared surface weeds to help.

Start: 10.00am Apple Tree, Stockwell Lane, Woodmancote. Please park at the far end of the car park.





Willersey Parish Council

The Parish Council does not hold a formal meeting in August, but this doesn't mean we have been idle. We commissioned a new speed survey in Collin Lane, in conjunction with our speed camera, as we are aware that residents remain concerned about speeding vehicles and the build outs.

We are exploring possibilities and costs for works at the Methodist Church Green, to see if accessibility can be improved, subject to budgetary constraints and legal restrictions. In addition, conversations have been held with Gloucestershire Highways regarding various road and footpath issues around the village. This has met with mixed success, safety issues at Jordans Farmhouse cannot be started until the new financial year, due to lack of funds at County Council level.

However, work is due to commence in September on a new stretch of footpath on Broadway Road, to address the precarious crossing at Nutgrove/Wrenswood, This is something the PC has campaigned for in excess of over 3 years.

Residents can report issues directly to Gloucestershire Highways using the Fix My Street app or online forum. The Duck Pond is due for its biannual maintenance in the autumn, and it is to be hoped our growing duck population will appreciate their home improvements! Our thanks go to Liz Ward for her support of the PC in feeding the ducks appropriately.

We hope residents enjoyed the Bank Holiday offerings, with the activities held on the greens courtesy of the PC. The cemetery wall was repaired recently, and new planting has taken place to enhance the surroundings. Access to the whole churchyard is now available from the church car park, down accessible paths which we hope will be of benefit to those less mobile. We have also been conversing with Severn Trent over ongoing Sewage issues. This remains of concern to us, as well as residents, especially in light of proposed applications for housing developments within the village. Recently, Severn Trent were carrying out manhole surveys throughout the village, which may or may not have relevance to these.

No formal planning applications have been received, at the time of writing, and we will of course keep you informed as soon as something is received.

Recent Village Sightings

The more unusual creatures that we are sometimes fortunate to spot are always something of a bonus, like the racing pigeon complete with identification rings that was noted in a Willersey garden recently. Perhaps racing pigeons are seen by some as more attractive looking than our common wood pigeon? But if we only occasionally saw maitre d'hotel type waddling wood pigeons they might just be flavour of the month. Attracting three buzzing May bugs to your face whilst out wearing a head torch, an account shared recently, might not be everyone's top fancy, but great to know they are out there as part of our wildlife network.

Getting up close and looking at out insects can reveal such beautiful creatures like the noted metallic green and purple striped rosemary beetle. There have been other sightings of the day flying hummingbird hawk-moth that is sometimes seen as a good luck omen. They have truly amazing flying skills, hovering as they sip nectar through their long proboscis. Further news of hedgehog garden visits from three sources, with one sliding into a kitchen to finish off a cat's supper. Sadly some of the more unusual spots of once common wildlife is much rarer here these days like the high flying musical skylark recently reported. But they're still here, just.

Migrating swifts in number were seen by several people with one magical account capturing some low **17**

level feeding as they refuelled. By the time you read this these eternal wanders will likely be well below the Sahara desert, like the returning swallows and house martins, all hopefully to return to us next April/May.

Another garden browsing deer has been spotted. Fingers crossed this will have been a good summer for some local breeding birds.

Certainly mewing buzzard youngsters have been audibly in evidence. Large mixed flocks of tits have been doing the rounds of garden feeders. Good quality fat balls attract the tits; and sunflower hearts will bring in those delightful red crowned goldfinches.

The male mallard ducks on the pond are a good example, where for some time they look not dissimilar to the females before re-growing new feathers to achieve their more striking and distinctive appearance with a glossy green head and white collar ready for the next breeding season.

Bird feathers were once highly prized accessories for women's fashion where birds such as hummingbirds, storks, cranes, grebes and many other species were slaughtered both here and worldwide for extravagantly feathered hats. Even some of the more expensive women's hats were adorned with whole stuffed birds as part of the decoration for those in high society.

But towards the end of the 19th Century a small group of women lead by Etta Lemon – a name that many of us might be unfamiliar with - campaigned vigorously against this barbaric practice, and duly becoming the founders of the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds. The fur and feather trade was at one time big business with powerful vested interests ranged against these pioneering women. Interestingly for many years these women were completely airbrushed out of the RSPB history books, with men dominating the association and taking credit for their successes as if these influential women had never existed.

Happily, in more recent years, this has been rectified with full recognition of the leadership shown by Etta Lemon and her colleagues, with their photographs now prominently displayed in many RSPB reserves. Part of their legacy is that discrimination against the roles that women might hold has long since changed and is now underlined by Beccy Speight's appointment as the head of the RSPB, which continues to spearhead this important work to support bird life both here and across the world
