

VICAR'S LETTER – February 2026

'Rich meaning and new discoveries'

Have you ever visited a desert-like wilderness? As I look out on the cool, sometimes rain-lashed village in which I live, I find it hard to imagine what it would be like, though the heat sounds attractive! I've been thinking about wilderness because the season of Lent remembers the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness of Judea before the start of his public ministry.

You might never experience life in a desert, but you'll know that we sometimes speak of another kind of wilderness – those times in life when events happen leaving us asking 'where next?' It could be illness, redundancy, relationship breakdown, bereavement. Or it could be a more general questioning of our purpose in times of transition. The common factor is the uncertainty of not knowing.

But wilderness can also be good, life-giving even. For Jesus, I imagine it as a place where he could put aside distractions, ask hard questions about the future, listen to the still small divine voice, be strengthened to resist temptation. He certainly emerged with a clear sense of purpose and priorities.

I wonder if we all could do with a bit of wilderness in our lives, the opportunity to ditch the distractions, and find time to ask the questions we're often too busy to face. Who knows what creative ideas, what renewed sense of purpose, might emerge for us?

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, a day marked by solemnity and penitence, falling 46 days before Easter Sunday in the Western Christian calendar, and is followed by 40 days (excluding Sundays) of reflection and self-denial, mirroring Jesus' time in the wilderness.

Lent provides us with a time to explore the things that might bring life, even when it seems that much is uncertain, or even falling apart. As we move through the Lenten season, let us make time to pause and reflect, to deepen our appreciation of God's goodness as we look towards Easter.

The day before Ash Wednesday is Shrove Tuesday, when traditionally pancakes were made to use up leftover eggs, milk, and butter before the time of fasting. So, make sure you enjoy your pancakes with whatever is your favourite topping - sugar, syrup or lemon perhaps - and may Lent truly be for you a time of rich meaning and new discoveries.

Nature Box - The Owl, the Fox and the Stoat

Absolutely everyone has a nature story.

It was early one morning that the barn owl flew alongside the car, close enough for us to make eye contact. It was probably only for a moment, but in my memory this savoured wildlife encounter seemed much longer. Although the owl encounter was a happy accident, the meeting with the fox was more of a hoped for sighting of wildlife of some description whilst out walking. The dog fox had clearly seen me approaching for some time. Unbeknown to me it was quietly sunning itself quite high up in a tree. But when it decided that I was perhaps a little too close for comfort it hopped down, glanced once more in my direction before calmly trotting off and out of sight.

And what about the stoat? Once again a touch of serendipity, as the unscripted chance meeting occurred whilst out cycling on a really quiet back lane, when the stoat ran across the road with three kits following. She was clearly moving them to another den for safety as stoats often do.

No one is an absolute beginner when it comes to such brushes with nature. It is hard not to think that everyone has at some point enjoyed such an experience. But just as the sportsman or sportswoman often quote 'The more I practice the luckier I get' the same is true of wildlife encounters. It doesn't even have to be a special effort sometimes. Perhaps a walk to the shops or a stroll with the dog or just weeding in the garden can offer such happenchance opportunities. But certainly being attuned to the natural world around us – just looking and listening – can make all the difference.

And do we always need to know what we are witnessing or be able to name the bird, mammal or insect we are seeing? Not knowing but still wondering and savouring the moment remains a powerful experience that might live long in the memory and enriching our lives.

Paths Around Willersey Scheme

January 2026

Hello from the PAWS Group, following the Festive Break. The work of the Group has continued over this period.

Gloucestershire County Highways recently constructed a new path and crossing point on the B4632. It is far better than the previous arrangement and the finish is very good for wheelchair users.



The previous crossing point was dangerously close to the blind bend and has been moved further away. The PAWS Group has concerns however that the new crossing point is still too close to the bend, and that there is still significant danger, from vehicles coming around the blind bend, for people crossing the road. Indeed I was recently using the crossing point when a vehicle, which I did not hear, came around the bend quickly. The driver braked sharply and came to a halt not too far from where I was in the middle of the road. We have received complaints from several people who have experienced similar near misses. The PAWS Group contacted Gloucestershire County Highways and the Parish Council reporting this. We believe that the crossing point should be located another thirty metres or so further away from the blind bend; to give extra time for traffic and pedestrians to see each other. Electric vehicles are virtually silent which adds to the danger.

Gloucestershire County Highways has the final decision in regard to alterations as it is responsible for this stretch of path. It has responded and it appears that at this stage no alterations are planned. We will be continuing to petition for change. If you are using the crossing please take great care!

If you have any views or have experienced any similar incidents it is important that you contact Gloucestershire County Highways, The Parish Council, and/or The PAWS Group and report it. The email addresses are listed below. If you contact the PAWS Group we can gauge Public concern, monitor actions, and also if you agree, forward your complaint to the relevant authorities.

RECENT VILLAGE SIGHTINGS



Let's begin with a big shout out for the many reports received recently from Roberta, Jo, Robin, Donald, Sandy, Nigel, Cathy, Sarah, Heather, Robert, Helen, Pete, Gi, Sue, Louise, Richard, Shirley, Sue, Mike, Siriol and Steve.

Our recent varied and unpredictable weather has seen a few unusual reports. The brimstone butterfly is one of the earliest on the wing each spring, but to see one in December is most unusual. Hedgehogs of course hibernate but the mild December weather saw several reports of hedgehogs briefly roused from their slumbers. The white pheasant that has been seen in

many gardens for a number of weeks is something of rarity; and the muntjac deer that turned up in another Willersey garden is not an everyday occurrence either.

Although it is well understood that our wildlife is under pressure from habitat loss and climate change the varied reports received are most heartening. So in no particular order let's celebrate the village sighting of jays, a little owl, a brief garden visit of a pied wagtail, elegant collared doves which are usually seen in pairs, strings of long tailed tits doing the rounds, a large flock of starlings, blackcaps, green and greater spotted woodpeckers that are doing well locally, green finch, that do seem to be less in evidence currently, several red kites and hunting sparrowhawks, a grey wagtail, and colder weather of late seeing redpolls, a brambling and a woodcock. Some really encouraging reasons to be feeling positive.

Many regular contributors have been commenting upon the lack of blackbirds and goldfinches in gardens during the autumn, but the colder weather seems to have reminded them of our garden bounty. Local sightings of 16 kestrel have been shared since the turn of the year. Their trademark hovering or perched on a telegraph pole or similar often being the best places to spot them. Thanks for kestrel sightings and please keep them coming.

Valentine's Day on February 14th is galloping towards us so note to self about ordering those flowers; but it is also the start of National Bird Box Week. A good time to pop up that bird box you might have thought about erecting. Small bird boxes with 25cm or 28cm entrance

holes for tits facing north or north/west at about 5/6ft high often work best.

Finally, the numbers from the Willersey Garden Bird Watch Survey are currently being crunched and will be shared in the next edition.

NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

Both our last meeting of 2025 and the first of 2026, saw the Parish Council focusing on proposed planning applications for development; flooding; highways and village upkeep. The planning applications for Folly View and Terrify continue to be appraised by CDC. Thames water, Severn Trent and National Landscapes have all expressed concerns regarding Folly View and Severn Trent is doing further investigative work. Highways has also objected to the Terrify application. There is no current update on any proposed development adjacent to Willow Green.

The heavy rains over the last few weeks have caused flooding again. We would ask that people continue to report flooding to our clerk, who will direct you on who else to contact. We are feeding all these issues to the Cotswold District Council who are handling the planning applications.

Roads continue to be an issue and speeders worry many in the village. The speed camera in Collin Lane does not seem to be as efficient as we would like, the PC will be exploring the positioning and improved signage. The PC voted to install a new camera in Broadway Road, learning from the lessons learnt from the Collin Lane camera. Speeders are now receiving letters from the police and Peter Cottle, our lead councillor on this subject, has been proactive in identifying persistent speeders in marked company vehicles and making contact with the companies.

There has been concern in the village regarding the positioning of the crossing points on the new path on the Broadway Road. The concerns have been raised with Highways by the Parish Council, who feel that the crossing points are safe, but the Council are supportive of PaWS in taking these concerns forward.

Works around the village will continue including in the recreation ground, in Pool Orchard and the Greens which have seen some tidying recently.

The PC will meet again at 7pm on February 16th 2026- you are most welcome to attend. Jane Rintoul


